- Alameda Police Department has funded and provided two School Resource Officers (SRO) for 23 years.
- SRO Officers are located at each traditional high school and serve all of the schools in the attendance area.
- Their role is to build relationships with students, staff, and the community to help ensure safety.
- SRO Gandara is assigned to Alameda High School.
- SRO Miele is assigned to Encinal High School.

Safe Schools – History of Work

- School site inspections are conducted by APD and AUSD
 Maintenance and Facilities Department to evaluate classrooms and buildings for safety.
- Clear policy and recommendations are given to classroom teachers on how to increase safety of their students and themselves in a critical incident.
- Practice drills have been conducted involving APD, AFD, CERT at Lincoln Middle School in 2007 and Alameda High School in 2011.
- Table top exercises were conducted in fall 2012 with AUSD Administrators and APD.
- Standard and uniform emergency procedures have been implemented district-wide.


Safe Schools – Regular Safety Habits

- Yearly updates to site emergency plans
- Fire Drills:
 - Monthly fire drill at Elementary Level
 - 4 times each year at Middle School
 - 2 times each year at High School
- Earthquake Drills:
 - Yearly at all levels
- Intruder Drills:
 - Yearly at Elementary Level
 - 2 times each year at Secondary Level
- Training of Staff on Emergency Procedures:
 - Yearly at all levels

 Share 911 is our Internet Based Emergency Management System



Safe Schools – Share 911 System Features




- Allows any employee at a school site to quickly and simultaneously alert all members of the school network (including law enforcement) of an emergency such as an intruder on campus.
- All employees at the site, members of district office on the school's network and law enforcement will receive an alert via both text message and email.
- Enables all members of the school to be quickly notified, resulting in schools being able to quickly respond to secure the campus, its students and its staff.
- Members of the network check in and identify their status which allows law enforcement and administration to allocate resources in response.

• Share 911 Check-in Feature:



Safe Schools – Share 911 System Benefits



- In a critical incident, it can take 3 minutes or more before the initial first responder arrives at the school campus.
- The use of Share 911 can result in a school locking down as fast as 67 seconds or even quicker.
- Compiles all of the valuable intel about the incident in one location versus traditional methods of phone calls, emails, etc.
- Law enforcement and emergency services are able to use the intel to plan their response and entry onto the campus.

Safe Schools - Implementation of Share 911

- SHARE
- AUSD Administrators were trained to use Share 911 on August 18, 2014.
- This fall, school site Principals invited their staff to join the network, facilitated trainings, and conducted drill simulations for entire staff.
- Schools must complete two successful simulation drills using Share 911 to go live on the system.
- As of today, (March 10, 2015), nine schools are "live" on the system. Remaining schools are training and will go "live" this spring.
