Curriculum Selection Process

- In June, the Teaching and Learning Department began to vet online learning platforms for use during the 2020-21 school year Remote model.
- Staff reviewed Acellus, Edgenuity, Edmentum, and UC Scout using the following criteria:
 - Common Core and NGSS alignment
 - A-G alignment, AP courses available
 - Ease of use and TK-12 Program
 - Training needed to use the program
 - Cost
- Staff chose Acellus as it met our needs based on the above

Issues Raised by Staff and Community

On August 24, 2020 it was brought to our attention that Acellus was being pulled from some schools in Hawaii due to racist, sexist, and other inappropriate content.

Steps Taken to Address Concerns

Staff immediately took the following steps once concerns were raised:

- Contacted Acellus to determine their plan for addressing this issue
- Began a lesson-level vetting of Acellus using an equity focused model
- Contacted Edgenuity, Edmentum, Virtual K-12, and Florida Virtual Academy to review curriculum
- Developed an equity focused model to use to review curriculum

Equity Focused Model*

Check the illustrations. Look for stereotypes: While stereotypes may not be this obvious, look for variations which may demean or ridicule characters because of their race or sex.

Check the story line. Standard for success: Does it take "white" behavior standards for a person of color to "get ahead"? Is this a singular, Eurocentric story?

Look at the lifestyles. Is the Person of Color depicted as "different," are negative value judgments implied

Weigh the relationships between people: Do the whites in the story possess the power, take the leadership, and make the important decisions? Do people of color and females function in essentially supporting roles?

Note the heroes: Ask this question: "Whose interest is a particular hero really serving?"

Equity Focused Model*, continued...

Consider the effects on a child's self-image: Ask this question: "Whose interest is a particular hero really serving?"

Consider the author's or illustrator's background: Analyze the biographical material on the jacket flap or the back of the book. What qualifies the author or illustrator to deal with the subject?

Check out the author's perspective: With the book /curriculum in question, read carefully to determine whether the direction of the author's perspective substantially weakens or strengthens the value of his/her written work.

Watch for loaded words: A word is loaded when it has insulting overtones. Examples of loaded adjectives (usually racist) are savage, primitive, conniving, lazy, superstitious, treacherous, wily, crafty, inscrutable, docile, and backward.

Look at the copyright date: Copyright dates, therefore, can be a clue as to how likely the book is to be overtly racist or sexist, although a recent copyright date, of course, is no guarantee of a book's relevance or sensitivity

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New Remote Curriculum Vetting Process

- Instructional Coaches, Teaching and Learning
 Coordinators, Special Education Coordinators, and staff
 with students in the Remote Program began the vetting
 process using the Equity Model* as well as the following:
 - Common Core and NGSS alignment
 - A-G alignment, AP courses available
 - Ease of use and TK-12 Program
 - Training needed to use the program
 - Cost
- Staff reviewed lessons in each program


