Instructional Purpose:

Students will have a great opportunity to learn firsthand about the workings of the government and the responsibilities they hold as citizens of the United States when they travel to Washington, D.C. for Close Up's Capital Experience. This exciting and unique program, run by the Close Up Foundation, the nation's largest civic education organization, consists of activities designed to introduce students to the history, politics, and culture of the nation's capital. From small-group seminars and workshops to meetings with congressional members and staff, lobbyists, and embassy officials to study visits of museums and monuments, this program offers students an insider's view of our history and government. Not only does this program offer students an insider's view of our history and government, but it includes separate programming for teachers, giving them a chance to share ideas with other educational professionals from across the country. Educators also attend seminars and workshops of their choice, updating and enhancing their American History and Civics curricula. Both students and teachers alike will return from Washington with renewed excitement and increased knowledge - both invaluable assets to the classroom environment.

Standards Addressed

- **U.S.8.3**: Students understand the foundations of the American political system and the ways in which citizens participate in it.
- U.S. 8.3.6: Describe the basic law-making process and how the Constitution provides numerous opportunities for citizens to participate in the political process and to monitor and influence government (e.g., function of elections, political parties, interest groups).
- U.S. 8.3.7: Understand the functions and responsibilities of a free press.
- Pre-Activities: Weekly and monthly meetings that focus on the above standards. The meetings also Develop schema for the locations visited and experiences they will participate in. Students participate in group projects, lecture, games, etc..
- Post Activities: The students are required to complete two notebooks on this trip to satisfy the history requirements. One notebook is created by the Alameda Close Up Club staff and the other is created by the Close-Up Foundation.
- Exclusions: We reserve the right to exclude students from participating in the trip for behavior issues. The situation is on a case by case basis. Due to the nature of this unique experience students must demonstrate a high level of responsibility and independence before the trip. Student who are not meeting the behavior requirements, will be given a written warning and parent signature. The next infraction results in the student being removed from the trip. The chaperones are limited to the teachers who volunteer to help run the program. Parents do not chaperone.

Provisions for Students not Participating:

Participating: This trip is an enrichment trip and many students choose not to participate, however, it is open to all eighth grade students in the Alameda Unified School District. This year, Lincoln, Wood, Academy of Alameda, NEA and Junior Jets have elected to participate in this enrichment experience.

To help supplement the overall trip expense, each site provides a fundraising opportunity for the students to raise some or all of their trip expenses. In addition, we do our best to find money for students who want to go, but financially cannot afford to travel.

Students not attending will continue with their regular school program.
