A. CALL TO ORDER

D. COMMUNICATIONS

1. Highlighting Alameda Schools - Wood Middle School

Cammie Harris, Wood Middle School Principal, gave the Board details about the programs at Wood Middle School. Ms. Harris outlined the Wood Middle School goals which include the opportunity for students to become independent learners who can be creative, innovative, and divergent thinkers. Wood School administration and staff also strive to provide brains-on engaging instruction and encouragement to allow students to think "outside the box." Wood Middle School teacher Pam Schaffer also brought

examples of student work for the Wood School Mousetrap Cars Project. The examples were passed around so Board members and staff in attendance at the meeting could get a close up look at the projects.

Board members thanked Ms. Harris and Ms. Schaffer for their work at Wood Middle School.

2. Written Correspondence

The Board received twenty-one (21) emails regarding the board vacancy and three (3) emails regarding an item on the Closed Session agenda.

6. Report from Employee Organizations

Audrey Hyman, President, Alameda Education Association (AEA): Ms. Hyman acknowledged the large crowd of AEA members who were in the room for the meeting. Ms. Hyman thanked Board members for attending the recent Alameda Firefighters/AEA Crab Feed. Ms. Hyman thanked Anne McKereghan and Lyndsey Schlax, Board candidates, who reached out to speak with AEA prior to tonight's Board appointment. Ms. Hyman stated she hopes every applicant for the Board vacancy will put their names on the ballot in November 2018. Ms. Hyman referenced the beginning of AEA negotiations with the district and stated her members' concerns are low pay, health insurance costs (sometimes half the paycheck), and recent programmatic changes that have left teachers feeling disrespected.

7. Public Comment

Josh Cotrell – parent of Ruby Bridges children: Mr. Cotrell asked the Board to consider allowing Ruby Bridges School to have three kindergarten classes for the 2017-18 school year.

Vickie Traverso – AUSD parent, in support of Lyndsey Schlax: Ms. Traverso stated she is in favor of Lyndsey Schlax for the vacant Board of Education seat.

Matt Huxley – Executive Director of Academy of Alameda Schools: Mr. Huxley stated AOA Elementary School and AOA Middle School are continuously impacted by the under allocation of space by AUSD. Mr. Huxley stated the district cannot prioritize adults (at Adult School) over children in Alameda. Mr. Huxley asked the Board to please consider a long term lease with AOA.

M. Clem – student on AHS Varsity Soccer Team – parent Paul Clem: Ms. Clem stated she was injured during Alameda High School soccer practice on Thompson Field. Mr. Clem stated Thompson Field is liability. Mr. Clem stated he would like to work with the district to come up with a solution for the deteriorated Thompson Field.

Maureen Feldman – parent of 8^{th} grade Jr. Jet student: Ms. Feldman stated she is not in favor of recent changes to enrollment/admissions policy for ASTI. Ms. Feldman stated these were made mid-year and this has had an adverse impact on many students. Ms. Feldman stated there is not equity across the district.

Michael Shaler – teacher at Alameda Adult School: Mr. Shaler stated he is happy to serve community of adult learners at the Adult School and that many of his students have children who go to schools in Alameda.

Laura Nielsen – community member, in support of Lyndsey Schlax: Ms. Neilsen stated she is in favor of Lyndsey Schlax for the vacant Board of Education seat.

Michelle Lager – AUSD parent, in support of Lyndsey Schlax: Ms. Lager stated she is in favor of Lyndsey Schlax for the vacant Board of Education seat.

Ben Rose – parent of Ruby Bridges children: Mr. Rose asked the Board to consider allowing Ruby Bridges School to have three kindergarten classes for the 2017-18 school year. Mr. Rose asked for greater collaboration between the district and the Ruby Bridges community.

Kate Meissert – parent of incoming Maya Lin student, in support of Lyndsey Schlax: Ms. Meissert stated she is in favor of Lyndsey Schlax for the vacant Board of Education seat.

8. Closed Session Action Report

During Closed Session, the Board voted 3-1 with Members Lym, Harris, and Williams in favor of authorizing the district to commence litigation against Community Learning Center Schools, Inc. (CLCS) regarding the recent removal of a member of their Board of Directors.

F. GENERAL BUSINESS

6. <u>Alameda Education Association (AEA) Sunshine Reopener Proposals to AUSD</u>

Lead negotiator Judith Klinger presented the Board with the Alameda Education Association (AEA) Reopener Proposals. AEA opened Article 8, Teaching Hours and Article 14, Salary. Ms. Klinger stated the district needs to pay teachers before budget decisions are made. Ms. Klinger also stated Alameda teachers are among the lowest paid teachers in Alameda County. Ms. Klinger stated if the district keeps operating this way, there will be empty classrooms.

7. Kickoff for Alameda Promise/Collaboration with College of Alameda

COA president Tim Karas explained the Alameda Promise campaign which gives one year of free college (plus funds to cover textbook costs) to all graduating AUSD students. Mr. Karas stated he hopes this will help mitigate gaps and barriers to higher education to Alameda students.

Board members thanked Mr. Karas for the Alameda Promise initiative.

3. Interview of Candidates and Selection of Appointee for Vacant Board Seat

The Board received applications from nine (9) candidates for the Board seat recently vacated when Board member Solana Henneberry passed away. The application period for submitting an application was from March 1st – March 8th. Candidates were vetted by staff to make sure legal requirements were met. The candidates were then invited to be interviewed by the Board. The nine candidates who attended the Board meeting were: Doreen Bracamontes, Lynn Christiansen Esquer, Leslie Ann Fales, Lisa Maxwell, Barbara McClung, Anne McKereghan, Suki Mozenter, Lyndsey Schlax, and Karen Vigna. Board President Gary K. Lym gave the candidates each three minutes to make a statement. Candidates drew numbers to see what order their statements would be given in. The following is a summary of the candidate's three minute statements.

Leslie Fales – Ms. Fales stated she is a local resident and grew up going to Alameda schools. Ms. Fales is a former student Board member. Ms. Fales stated AUSD has given so much to her family and she would now like to give back to community. Ms. Fales stated the district faces significant challenges and she hopes to work collaboratively with the Board to figure out how to equally apportion resources and retain high quality teachers.

Suki Mozenter – Ms. Mozenter stated she has been an elementary school teacher for a really long time and was an AUSD teacher of the year finalist, oversaw ELD for Oakland Unified School District, worked on the AUSD Common Core Transitional Plan, and worked on the AUSD EL Masterplan. Ms. Mozenter stated she would like to help unlock the full potential of the district.

Barbara McClung – Ms. McClung stated she is the parent of current AUSD students and is currently working as the Director of Behavioral Health Initiatives for Oakland Unified School District. Ms. McClung stated she has championed mental health services (all students at OUSD schools have access to mental health services) for district students, has forged a national model for racial justice and equity, and currently manages a district budget of over \$5 million dollars. Ms. McClung stated she believes all staff should receive training in restorative justice and Multi-Tiered Systems of Support. Ms. McClung stated that this work in OUSD has shown a drop in suspensions and traditional discipline.

Lynn Christiansen Esquer – Ms. Christiansen Esquer stated she would like to withdraw her application for Board candidate. Ms. Christiansen Esquer stated she supports Anne McKereghan for Board candidate. Ms. Christiansen Esquer stated she wants to honor (former Board member) Solana Henneberry and feels Anne McKereghan would also honor Solana Henneberry.

Doreen Bracamontes – Ms. Bracamontes stated she is an Alameda resident, a parent of two current AUSD students, and a national board certified teacher. Ms. Bracamontes stated she wants to be a Board member because she can further goals of the Board and administration. Ms. Bracamontes stated she has a proven track record of results with students. Ms. Bracamontes stated she was moved by the teacher statements she has heard tonight and feels the district needs to figure out a way to retain its teachers.

Lyndsey Schlax – Ms. Schlax stated she would like to help the district make schools more than just a place. Ms. Schlax stated she believes schools should be a place where children can safely learn from mistakes, and she stated she has seen schools change communities for the better. Ms. Schlax stated she would like to see all AUSD schools move further towards arts integration, LGBTQ studies, and service based learning. Ms. Schlax stated Alameda still faces major funding inadequacies.

Lisa Maxwell – Ms. Maxwell thanked the Board for considering her candidacy. Ms. Maxwell stated she feels the areas of concern for AUSD are retaining teachers, communication with various schools in Alameda, and figuring out how to maximize enrollment that may come from growth at Alameda Point. Ms. Maxwell stated she has a background in Human Resources contract negotiations and she has been involved in the unionization of a local charter school. Ms. Maxwell stated she would like to see AUSD come together with the Alameda charter schools towards a common goal. Ms. Maxwell stated AUSD and charters are both trying to educate children.

Karen Vigna – Ms. Vigna stated she is a lifelong Alameda resident, has attended local schools, is the mom of a 6 year old child, and has served as a principal at Holy Names, where she has been able to balance immense responsibilities. Ms. Vigna stated she feels it is a gift to have been able to grow up in Alameda and appreciates the Alameda community and her supportive neighbors. Ms. Vigna stated that historically Alameda is a diverse community that is careful not to change too drastically and too quickly. Ms. Vigna stated she is proud that Alameda has become more open and diverse. Ms. Vigna stated her goal is to make good decisions and stated she knows that these decisions impact the entire community. Ms. Vigna stated she has very large shoes to fill but is open to the challenge.

Anne McKereghan – Ms. McKereghan stated she was saddened to be applying for the role of Board member under the circumstances (the passing of former Board member Solana Henneberry), but she understands why the process to appoint has happened so quickly. Ms. McKereghan stated she started off

as a Board member of Alameda Education Foundation in 2003 and has worked alongside many of the current Board in that capacity. Ms. McKereghan stated she knows there are many issues coming forward for AUSD, and she hopes to be able to use her skills as a former accountant/controller and local realtor to solve those issues. Ms. McKereghan stated she understands financials and hopes to be able to use her accounting skills to focus limited district resources on classrooms. Ms. McKereghan stated she knows how to reach out to a wide variety of community members to bring everyone together. Ms. McKereghan stated it is impossible to replace former Board member Solana Henneberry who brought a deep dedication to her role as Board member.

Barbara Kahn – former AUSD Board of Education member, in support of Anne McKereghan: Ms. Kahn stated she is in favor of Anne McKereghan for the vacant Board of Education seat.

Barry Savin – former AUSD teacher, in support of Leslie Fales: Mr. Savin stated he is in favor of Leslie Fales for the vacant Board of Education seat.

Olivia Higgins – AUSD parent, LGBTQ Roundtable member, in support of Barbara McClung: Ms. Higgins stated she is in favor of Barbara McClung for the vacant Board of Education seat.

Sue Taylor – parent of former AUSD student, in support of Leslie Fales: Ms. Taylor stated she is in favor of Leslie Fales for the vacant Board of Education seat.

Gene Kahane –AUSD teacher, in support of Leslie Fales: Mr. Kahane stated he is in favor of Leslie Fales for the vacant Board of Education seat.

Joan Tharp – retired public school teacher, current AUSD substitute, in support of Barbara McClung: Ms. Tharp stated she is in favor of Barbara McClung for the vacant Board of Education seat.

Damon Paiz –community member, in support of Leslie Fales: Mr. Paiz stated he is in favor of Leslie Fales for the vacant Board of Education seat.

Bob Kreitz – community member, in support of appointment of candidate who was in recent election: Mr. Kreitz urged the Board to select the candidate who came in fourth in the recent Board of Education election.

LaDonna Dixon – education professional, in support of Barbara McClung: Ms. Dixon stated she is in favor of Barbara McClung for the vacant Board of Education seat.

Aimee Barnes – parent of AUSD student, in support of Leslie Fales: Ms. Barnes stated she is in favor of Leslie Fales for the vacant Board of Education seat.

Brian Goldstein – director of Policy and Development for SF Juvenile Center, in support of Lyndsey Schlax: Mr. Goldstein stated he is in favor of Lyndsey Schlax for the vacant Board of Education seat.

Member Williams stated she was supported by the community and one of the candidates tonight was also a candidate in November and was supported by 10,000 citizens of Alameda. Member Williams stated she hopes the candidates who are not selected tonight continue to stay engaged in Alameda Unified School District. Member Williams stated she supports Anne McKereghan for Board member.

Member Lym stated he was impressed by the nine phenomenal candidates. Member Lym explained to the audience that in the past two years as a Board member he has been a part of three Board appointments. Member Lym stated the current AUSD Board represents a wide range of talent. Member Lym stated the current Board members were all elected by the community. Member Lym explained the Board had two choices to fill the seat left by Member Henneberry's recent passing - the choice was to either appoint a candidate or have a special election. 9. Approval of Second Interim Financial Report

Twice during the fiscal year, a school district is required to submit a financial report certifying the district's ability to meet its financial obligations for the current year and two subsequent years. The reports examine the district's attendance, spending patterns, fund balance, reserve for economic uncertainties, and multi-year projections. Shariq Khan, Chief Business Officer, presented the 2016-2017 Second Interim which reports the district's financial position as of January 31, 2017.

Mr. Khan highlighted several areas of concern for the district. Areas of concern include ongoing expenditures funded by one-time transfers (including recent increases in employee compensation), Special Education costs, transportation costs, the district's non-competitive salary schedule, deferred maintenance, and Measure B1 parcel tax litigation.

Superintendent Sean McPhetridge highlighted other areas of concern by stating the district needs to have tight FTE (full time employee) allocation in order to have money to pay our teachers. Dr. McPhetridge also reminded the audience that over the last two years the former Board made decisions about reserve funds and used deferred maintenance money in order to give salary increases to staff. Dr. McPhetridge stated the current board will have to decide what their values are going forward.

A Board member stated if we don't make an effort to pay our staff more, staff will not be willing to help the district in times of financial catastrophe. The Board member stated she doesn't want to prioritize building reserves over paying district staff.

Dr. McPhetridge stated the future of the district is pretty harrowing. Dr. McPhetridge stated he agrees with the Board member and knows we can trust all our employees to make sacrifices in times of need. Dr McPhetridge stated it is the job of district leadership to lay out tradeoffs and have data based discussions.

A Board member asked if the district had used one-time money to fund salary increases. Shariq Khan responded by saying last year fiscal staff transferred \$2.5 million out of the deferred maintenance fund to use for increased salary compensation.

Dr. McPhetridge stated he agrees district employees need to get paid more and it is a travesty that our employees get paid so low. Dr. McPhetridge asked the public to help elect legislators that will help us get education funding. Dr. McPhetridge stated it is a social justice crisis. Dr. McPhetridge explained that he sees AUSD's wonderful student Board members and thinks they will probably go on to college, but many of their peers will not due to the underfunding of education in the state of California. A Board member agreed with this statement.

A Board member asked about a recent demographic study and asked if AUSD will gain any enrollment from the new housing on the former Navy Base. CBO Shariq Khan stated that AUSD will not gain any noticeable enrollment due to the cost of the housing.

A Board member asked to be able to see previous year budgets next to current year and future year projections with future Board presentations.

Motion to approve the Second Interim Financial Report with the request for more historical data to be included in upcoming budget presentations.



AMENDMENT NO. 1 TO LEASE LEASEBACK DOCUMENTS:

1. FACILITIES LEASE BY AND BETWEEN LATHROP CONSTRUCTION ASSOCIATES, AS LESSOR AND ALAMEDA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AS LESSEE, DATED AS OF NOVEMBER 1, 2016.

This Amendment to Lease Leaseback Documents ("Amendment") is made and executed this 28th day of March, 2017 between Lathrop Construction Associates, Inc ("Developer" or "Lessor") and the Alameda Unified School District, a California public school district located in Alameda, California ("District" or "Lessee") (collectively, the "Parties")

RECITALS

- A. WHEREAS, Developer and District executed the following two leases pursuant to Section 17406 of the Education Code of the State of California under which Developer is to provide for construction consisting of the modernization of portions of Alameda High School. ("Project"):
 - 1. Site Lease By And Between Alameda Unified School District As Lessor And Lathrop Construction Associates, Inc. as Lessee, dated as of November 1, 2016 ("Site Lease"); and
 - 2. Facilities Lease By And Between Lathrop Construction Associates, Inc.as Lessor And Alameda Unified School District as Lessee, dated as of November 1, 2016 ("Facilities Lease") (Collectively, with all incorporated exhibits, the "Lease Leaseback Documents").
- B. WHEREAS, it is now the desire and intention of the Parties to amend the Lease Leaseback Documents as set forth below.

NOW, THEREFORE, in light of the foregoing facts and in further consideration of the promises and agreements of the Parties set forth herein below, it is mutually agreed as follows:

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

Except as revised herein, all other provisions of the Lease Leaseback Documents and/or addendum shall remain in full force and effect and are reaffirmed. If there is any conflict between this Amendment and any provision of the Lease Leaseback Documents, the provisions of this Amendment shall control.

THE FOLLOWING CHANGE SHALL BE MADE TO THE FACILITIES LEASE:

1. Section 11.2.2 shall be amended to read as follows:

Contract Time / Construction Schedule. It hereby understood and agreed that assuming the District issues a Notice to Proceed on or before <u>November 2, 2016</u>. District and Contractor may also approve additional changes in the Construction Schedule. District shall have beneficial occupancy on or before <u>March 28, 2019</u> and Project Completion shall be on or before <u>April 9, 2019</u>. The time period between the Notice to Proceed and Completion shall be the total Contract time ("Contract Time"). The Construction shall be performed pursuant to the construction schedule, attached hereto as **Exhibit F** ("Construction Schedule"). The Construction Schedule must be approved by the District prior to execution of this Facilities Lease.

- 2. Exhibit "C" shall be replaced with Amended Exhibit C, a copy of which, is attached hereto as Exhibit A to this Amendment.
- 3. Exhibits "F", "J" and "K" shall be added to the Facilities Lease and are collectively attached hereto as Exhibit B to this Amendment.

AMENDED EXHIBIT C TO FACILITIES LEASE

GUARANTEED PROJECT COST AND OTHER PROJECT COST, FUNDING, AND PAYMENT PROVISIONS

- 1. Site Lease Payments. As indicated in the Site Lease, Contractor shall pay <u>One Dollar (\$1.00)</u> to the District as consideration for the Site Lease.
- 2. Guaranteed Project Cost. Pursuant to the Facilities Lease, Contractor will cause the Project to be constructed for Forty-Five Million Five Hundred Sixteen Thousand Two Hundred Seventy-One Dollars (\$45,516,271.00), ("Guaranteed Project Cost"). Except as indicated herein for modifications to the Project approved by the District, Contractor will not seek additional compensation from District in excess of Guaranteed Project Cost. District shall pay the Guaranteed Project Cost to Contractor in the form of Tenant Improvement Payments and Lease Payments as indicated herein. The Guaranteed Project Cost includes the following components and as further detailed herein:

2.1. Cost to Perform Work.

- 2.1.1. **Subcontract Costs.** Payments made by the Contractor to Subcontractors, which payments shall be made in accordance with the requirements of the Contract Documents.
- 2.1.2. **Contractor-Performed Work.** Costs incurred by the Contractor for self-performed work.
- 2.2. General Conditions. The fixed amount to be paid be for all costs for labor, equipment and materials for the items identified therein which are necessary for the proper management of the Project, shall be as set forth in Attachment One and shall include all costs paid or incurred by the Contractor for insurance (except for general liability insurance), permits, taxes, and all contributions, assessments and benefits, holidays, vacations, retirement benefits, and incentives, whether required by law or collective bargaining agreements or otherwise paid or provided by Contractor to its employees. The District reserves the right to request changes to the personnel, equipment, or facilities provided as General Conditions as may be necessary or appropriate for the proper management of the Project, in which case, the cost of General Conditions shall be increased or reduced accordingly.
- **2.3. Fees.** All fees, assessments and charges that are required to be paid to other agencies or entities to permit, authorize or entitle construction, reconstruction or completion of the Project.

Any unused allowance or unused portion thereof shall be deducted from the Cost of the Work. The amount to deduct shall be calculated using the steps in the "Changes in the Work" provisions of **Exhibit "D"** to the Facilities Lease including the Deductive Change Order provisions therein.

2.4. Contingency.

2.4.1. N/A

- 2.5. Bonds and Insurance. Two percent (2%)
- 2.6. Overhead and Profit. Three percent (3%)

- **3. Payment of Guaranteed Project Cost.** District shall pay the Guaranteed Project Cost to Contractor in the form of Tenant Improvement Payments and Lease Payments as indicated herein.
 - **3.1.** Tenant Improvement Payments. Prior to the District's taking delivery or occupancy of the Project, the District shall pay to Contractor Forty Million Nine Hundred Sixty-Four Thousand Six Hundred Forty-Four Dollars (\$40,964,644) ("Tenant Improvement Payment(s)"), based on the amount of Work satisfactorily performed and approved by the District less the amount to be paid as Lease Payments, according to the Contractor's Schedule of Values (Exhibit "G" to the Facilities Lease) and pursuant to the provisions in Exhibit "D" to the Facilities Lease.
 - **3.2.** Lease Payments. After the Parties execute the Memorandum of Commencement Date, attached to the Facilities Lease as Exhibit "E," the District shall pay to Contractor Four Million Six Hundred Sixty-Three Thousand Three Hundred Thirty-Four Dollars (\$4,663,334) ("Lease Payment(s)"), as indicated below.
 - 3.2.1. The Lease Payments shall be consideration for the District's rental, use, and occupancy of the Project and the Project Site and shall be made in equal monthly installments for the duration of the Term.
 - 3.2.2. The District represents that the total annual Lease Payment obligation does not surpass the District's annual budget and will not require the District to increase or impose additional taxes or obligations on the public that did not exist prior to the execution of the Facilities Lease.
 - 3.2.3. Fair Rental Value. District and Contractor have agreed and determined that the total Lease Payments constitute adequate consideration for the Facilities Lease and are reasonably equivalent to the fair rental value of the Project. In making such determination, consideration has been given to the obligations of the Parties under the Facilities Lease and Site Lease, the uses and purposes which may be served by the Project and the benefits therefrom which will accrue to the District and the general public.

3.2.4. Each Payment Constitutes a Current Expense of the District.

- 3.2.4.1. The District and Contractor understand and intend that the obligation of the District to pay Lease Payments and other payments hereunder constitutes a current expense of the District and shall not in any way be construed to be a debt of the District in contravention of any applicable constitutional or statutory limitation or requirement concerning the creation of indebtedness by the District, nor shall anything contained herein constitute a pledge of the general tax revenues, funds or moneys of the District.
- 3.2.4.2. Lease Payments due hereunder shall be payable only from current funds which are budgeted and appropriated or otherwise made legally available for this purpose. This Facilities Lease shall not create an immediate indebtedness for any aggregate payments that may become due hereunder.
- 3.2.4.3. The District covenants to take all necessary actions to include the estimated Lease Payments in each of its final approved annual budgets.
- 3.2.4.4. The District further covenants to make all necessary appropriations (including any supplemental appropriations) from any source of legally available funds of the District for the actual amount of Lease Payments that come due and

payable during the period covered by each such budget. Contractor acknowledges that the District has not pledged the full faith and credit of the District, State of California or any state agency or state department to the payment of Lease Payments or any other payments due hereunder. The covenants on the part of District contained in this Facilities Lease constitute duties imposed by law and it shall be the duty of each and every public official of the District to take such action and do such things as are required by law in the performance of the official duty of such officials to enable the District to carry out and perform the covenants and agreements in this Facilitles Lease agreed to be carried out and performed by the District.

3.2.5. The Lease Payment Amount shall be paid pursuant to the following structure and the annual interest rate shall be at or below the then current Prime Rate as published in the

3.3. In no event shall the cumulative total of the Tenant Improvement Payments and the Lease Payments ever exceed the Guaranteed Project Price as defined herein, unless modified pursuant to Exhibit "D" to the Facilities Lease.

4.1. As indicated in the Facilities Lease, the Parties may add or remove specific scopes of work from the Project. Based on these change(s), the Parties may agree to a reduction or increase in the Guaranteed Project Cost. If a cost impact or a change is agreed to by the Parties, it shall be reflected as a reduction or increase in the Tenant Improvement Payments and paid upon the payment request from the Contractor when the work is performed, or deducted from the next payment request from the Contractor, as applicable.

- **4.2.** The Parties acknowledge that the Guaranteed Project Cost is based on the Construction Documents, including the plans, and specifications, as identified in **Exhibit "J" and "K"** to the Facilities Lease.
- **4.3. Cost Savings.** Contractor shall work cooperatively with Architect, subcontractors and District, in good faith, to identify appropriate opportunities to reduce the Project costs and promote cost savings. Any identified cost savings from the Guaranteed Project Cost shall be identified by Contractor, and if approved in writing by the District, that cost savings shall be deducted from the Guaranteed Project Cost. If any cost savings require revisions to the Construction Documents, Contractor shall work with the District with respect to revising the Construction Documents and, if necessary, obtaining the approval of DSA with respect to those revisions. At the District's discretion, any reasonable cost incurred by District and/or the Contractor for those revisions may be paid for out of the identified savings before it is deducted from the Guaranteed Project Cost. Contractor shall be entitled to an extension of Contract Time equal to the delay in Project Completion caused by any cost savings adopted by District, if requested in writing before the approval of the cost savings.
- **4.4. Insurance and Bond Reimbursements.** At Project Completion, Contractor shall require reimbursement from its insurance brokers and/or insurers and its bond brokers and/or sureties, all portions of Contractor's bond premiums, either paid or to be paid, that are not at-risk due to a reduction in the Guaranteed Project Cost. All amounts of premium reimbursement that Contractor receives from the Contractor's insurance brokers and/or insurers and its bond brokers and or sureties, shall be withheld by District from Contractor's Lease Payment(s). The District shall estimate this amount until Contractor indicates what the total amount of this reimbursement.

5. District's Purchase Option

- 5.1. If the District is not then in uncured Default hereunder, the District shall have the option to purchase not less than all of the Project in its "as-is, where-is" condition and terminate this Facilities Lease and Site Lease by paying the total remaining unpaid Lease Payments as of the date the option is exercised ("Option Price").
- 5.2. District shall provide Contractor no less than three (3) days' prior written notice that District is exercising its option to purchase the Project as set forth above on a specific date ("Option Date"). If the District exercises this option, the District shall pay directly to Contractor the Option Price on or prior to the Option Date and Contractor shall at that time deliver to District all reasonably necessary documents in recordable form to terminate this Facilities Lease and the Site Lease. District may record all such documents at District's cost and expense.
- **5.3** Under no circumstances can the first Option Date be on or before thirty-five (35) days after the Contractor completes the Project and the District accepts the Project.

However, once building/foundation lift commences, we must stop grouting at that location to prevent damage to the building. So structure uplift takes priority.

A: Based on our pilot testing program, we believe the dead load bearing pressure at the existing foundations is sufficient to obtain adequate soil densification before building uplift occurs. Test results and grout takes of the test program will be made available on request.

Q: On RCP it calls for acoustic plaster on gyp board per CL-1 SEE 19@A 10.1.
19@ A 10.1 does not show plaster. How do we bid the acoustic plaster?
A: 19/A10.1 shows the GB. 22/A10.1 shows the acoustic plaster. See also Specs Section 09 2150 Acoustical Plaster Ceilings.

Item No. 2. 23

Q: Science Building shows most toilet room accessories OFCI, but Central Building does not. Please clarify.

A: The following items are Owner Furnished and Contractor Installed (OFCI) throughout the project: Soap Dispensers, Paper Towel Dispensers, Toilet Seat Cover Dispensers, and Toilet Paper Dispensers.

Item No. 2. 24

Q: From Architectural Interior Elevations it appears some of the new brace frames are exposed but we did not find any wording or specs for possible AESS requirements. Please clarify if any AESS might be required and if so where and to what degree? A: There is no separate AESS specification, but follow specifications 05 1200 and 09 9123 for finishing exposed steel, including grinding welds to a smooth appearance per 05 1200 – 2.03B.

Item No. 2. 25

Q: 05500 Metal Fabrications is requiring an IAS AC172 Certification, please verify if our AISC Certified Shop Certification will satisfy this request? A: That is acceptable.

Item No. 2. 26

Q: In spec Section 12 3600 in paragraph 2.02 C. the lab countertops are called off as Phenolic Resin. In the same paragraph the sinks are called off to be the same material (phenolic resin). In the same spec but in other paragraphs the science countertops are reference as epoxy resin. Please clarify if the science countertops are Phenolic Resin or Epoxy Resin (to different

kinds of material)? The science sinks can only be epoxy resin as they are not available in phenolic resin. If possible please clarify this in addenda.

A: The countertops and related splashes to be Phenolic Resin. The science sinks can be epoxy resin.

Item No. 2. 27

Q: 7/A-9.3 calls for a drip flashing at the head of the storefront. Is this prefinished to match the storefront, or is this GSM that will be field painted? A: Please prefinish to match storefront.

Item No. 2. 28

Q: In the science building 3rd floor S3 line at SE line there is a 6x8 wood Column which has a 3" hole drilled through the 6 inch section of the Column. Also at the same location the beam has been notched. Please advise for repair or replace.

A: Provide 2x6 each side of wood post. Fasten to post with (2) rows of 16d nails spaced at 12" oc. No repair required at notched beam.

Item No. 2. 29

Q: Detail 4/S-5.3 calls out gusset plate weld to base plate each side of column "2XL" For RHSS 8 5/8" the single dimension is 22", if you double this on both sides of the column this would make the base plate 8'-0 long with only (6) anchor bolts. Please verify.

A: The total weld length is "2xL" across both gusset plates, not "2xL" at each gusset plate.

Item No. 2. 30

Q: We found splice details for the WF columns and HSS horizontal collectors but we did not find a splice detail for WF beams, we think the splicing of some WF will be absolutely mandatory, please provide a detail for this.

A: See Addendum 01 item number 1.63 for splice of wide flange beams. No wide flange beam splices permitted at braced frame beams. All proposed splice locations shall be included in the shop drawings for review by the Engineer.

Item No. 2 .31

Q: Auditorium WF girders: Will a single off-set splice (we wouldn't splice both girders at dead center) be allowed to get these members inside the building? If so verify detail from RFI #3 will apply or if a specific new detail might apply?

A: Contractor may splice W33 beams on S-C2.9 per attached added detail 3/S-C2.9. Maximum (2) splices per beam. Minimum 20 feet between splices.

Item No. 2. 32

Q: Science Bldg 2nd Floor S-S2.2 On Line S2 btwn SF & SG there are two HSS 7x7's called out and elevation detail 5/S6.2, this area is fine. However the same detail elevation is cut in other locations that show only single HSS collector members on plan both second and third floors.

All on Line S5 there are three locations calling out 5/S6.2 and probably a fourth that should be called out but isn't. Please clarify what is to happen at all four stair landing scenarios on Line S5 at both 2nd and 3rd floors.

A: At south west stair at the 2nd floor the detail callout is correct. At the south east stair at the 2nd floor, delete callout 5/S-6.2. Attach sides of HSS5x3 to existing concrete wall with angle tabs & screw anchors per 5/S-6.2 similar. Connect HSS to wide flange column per 23/S-5.1. At south west and south east stair at the 3rd floor, delete callout 5/S-6.2. Connect HSS beams to existing concrete beams per 13/S-6.2 similar, however no existing concrete slab occurs and the HSS beams are both aligned with top of joist. Provide angle tabs and screw anchors per 5/S-6.2 similar at HSS at stair.

Item No. 2. 33

Q: Adden #1 Item 1.56 We understand this item that some concrete or wood might interfere with new steel, totally expected in a retro-fit. However there is no way possible for us to quantify this in our bid and therefore we will be excluding this work entirely. A: Assume this work occurs at the base of each HSS column adjacent to an existing concrete wall or column.

Item No. 2. 34

Q: Adden #1 Item 1.59 Same reason as #6 we will be excluding any work having to do with new or existing hold-downs, just no way to quantify possible work.

A: Existing holdowns locations are specified on the plans. The scope of new and existing holdowns & anchor rods appears to be adequately specified to quantify.

Item No. 2. 35

Q: Adden #1 Item 1.60 Same as #6&7 designer gives no way to quantify this work (penetrations) AND they do not locate these new details on plan so even new work such as the threaded studs for nailers cannot be quantified.

A: Assume detail 17/S-6.2 occurs at each wide flange column at the 2nd floor, 3rd floor, and roof. Assume detail 17/S-6.2 occurs at each braced frame connection plate at the 2nd & 3rd floors. Assume detail 18/S-6.2 occurs at each braced frame connection plate at the 2nd & 3rd floors. Assume detail 19/S-6.2 occurs at each wide flange column at the 2nd floor, 3rd floor, and ceiling framing supporting the roof.

Item No. 2. 36

Q: Adden #1 Item 1.67 We don't see a gusseted beam seat in Det 3 to add to Det 2/S6.3 Please clarify.

A: "Gusseted beam seat" refers to the L6x6x3/4 angle with 3/8" stiffener on which the wide flange beam sits at 3/S-6.2. Include concrete screw anchors into existing concrete beam and machine bolts with slotted holes into the bottom flange of the beam.

Q: Adden #1 Items 1.68, 1.69 & 1.70 We see the added existing reinforcing splice plates but we see no way to quantify this work, we intend to exclude this work unless given better information.

A: The location & quantity of all existing reinforcing steel samples are located on each of the plans on sheets S-9.1, S-9.2, and S-9.3. All sampled reinforcing steel will require repair except where the existing concrete beam or column is noted to be removed or partially removed.

Item No. 2. 38

Q: Please provide a diaphragm nailing plan for the first floor, similar to what is shown on S-C2.3.

A: Diaphragm nailing plan not required for the first floor because new structural sheathing is typically not required. Where new raised floor is to be provided at S-S2.1, provide first floor diaphragm nailing per detail 1/S-4.2.

Item No. 2. 39

Q: 3/S6.3 calls for a new channel to be installed. Please confirm how this is possible given the joist that is existing and adjacent to this new work.

A: Remove adjacent existing framing as required to install new steel channel, then reinstall framing.

Item No. 2. 40

Q: SC2.5 shows the work for the new mechanical units. The LVLS are shown to cross the W8x48's at GL C3. It appears that 13/S1.2 and 15/S-6.2 will conflict with each other. Please confirm.

A: Terminate north end of LVL's at W8x48 beams to prevent conflict. Replace 4x12 at north end with 4x6 flat blocking to support the mechanical unit. Provide A34 each side and each end of blocking to existing rafter. Terminate south 4x12 at W8x48 to prevent conflict.

item No. 2 .41

Q: At the Science Bldg on grid line S5, between SA and SB, detail 1/S6.1 is called out. However at this location the joist run parallel to the wide flange beam. Detail 1/S6.1 only show the perpendicular condition. A detail at the parallel condition would be helplful.

A: See attached added detail 20/S-6.2 which applies along S5 between SA & SB and SL & SM at the 2nd & 3rd floors. At the roof at these locations, detail 10/S-6.3 applies.

Item No. 2. 42

Q: At the roof of the Science Bldg, between grid lines SA and SB there is a mechanical unit with a double 16" LVL each side. At the concrete wall (line SA) the plans call for titen screws at the hanger. Detail 17/S1.2 which is referenced for the framing indicates the 4x12 (which hangs off of the LVL) is directly below the 2x4 rafter. Details 10 and 11/S6.2 shows the wide flange

beam w/attached nailer directly below the rafters as well. Obviously there is a conflict. Please have the engineer clarify.

A: Attach the (2) 1.75"x16" LVL to W8x48 wood nailer with an LBV hanger. Provide beam stub and angled brace connection per 11/S-6.2 within 18" of south double LVL.

Item No. 2. 43

Q: Science building 3rd floor wood columns along S3 line and S4 line. Could you please provide a detail regarding hold downs for these Columns.

A: No holdown-to-post condition occurs at this location. No detail required.

Item No. 2. 44

Q: Central building east 2nd floor REF: S3 2.4/ C3 line and C4 line CQ and CQ.2 Indicates new wood posts for mech units they Appear to be in conflict with the lockers on the north and south Walls of corridor C228 as well as having to remove existing windows. Please advise. A: Central building east 2nd floor REF: S3 2.4/ C3 line and C4 line CQ and CQ.2 Indicates new wood posts for mech units they Appear to be in conflict with the lockers on the north and south Walls of corridor C228 as well as having to remove existing windows. Please advise.

Item No. 2. 45

Q: Sheet S3.8: At the science building 3rd floor between gridlines SJ and SL on S5, there is a note regarding interior concrete spalling adjacent the windows. The actual location for the spalling is between gridlines SG & SJ, was that the intention?

A: Please revise note to indicate interior spalling repair required between grids SG and SJ.

Item No. 2. 46

Q: The foundation plan, detail 3/S-4.1 calls for a new 3x ledger at the corridor side of the wall. Does that occur along the entire concrete wall at S4 or only where new pads are installed for the brace frames?

A: The 3x ledger at the corridor side of 3/S-4.1 is only intended to occur where a new concrete wall is required due to installation of a new pile cap. Framing at portions of the existing concrete wall to remain need not be replaced.

Item No. 2. 47

Q: Please clarify mechanical control requirements regarding door and window switches, fan controls, and CO2 sensors.

A: 1. Window and door switches are not required as referenced C/M5.4

2. VAV boxes in Science building have reheat coils. VAV boxes in central building do not have reheat coils.

3. Evernex draft fan control panel shall have a BACnet interface module. BMS shall monitor draft fan status (on/off/speed) and alarm on fail.

4. CO2 sensors will be used in all classrooms and will be utilized for demand control ventilation.

Q: Are the peninsula tables in the Chemistry and Laboratory classrooms in the scope of work? I can only find one note in Chemistry Lab S101 that notes them as NIC. Please clarify. A: The movable peninsula tables are not in the Construction Contract, and are shown as NIC on the drawings. However, the District and/or General Contractor may request a separate Proposal for these furniture items.

Item No. 2. 49

Q: The specification indicates that this project's Fire Alarm System will be Firelight (District Standard) – No substations. The Subcontractors we have contacted to bid this project have indicated that the existing Fire Alarm System for these buildings are Ceberus Pyrotronics now owned by Seimens Building Industries.

Please ask the design team which Fire Alarm System is to be quoted.

A: See ADD 01 Electrical and FA drawings pertaining to Fire Alarm System modifications.

-Interior rails are all painted steel. (The intent of one boxed note at stair sections 3/A-S6.2 stating "painted bronze" is to paint the existing streel rail a bronze color.)

Item No. 3. 07

Q: The project manual specifications call for both Riser and Plenum rated category 6 data cabling. Can you clarify if the project is a riser or plenum environment?

- **9.** Licenses and Permits. CONTRACTOR shall obtain and keep in force all licenses, permits, and certificates necessary for the performance of this Agreement.

10. Contractor Qualifications / Performance of Services.

- 10.1 Contractor Qualifications. CONTRACTOR is specially trained, experienced, competent and fully licensed to provide the Services required by this Agreement in conformity with the laws and regulations of the State of California, the United States of America, and all local laws, ordinances and regulations, as they may apply.
- **10.2** Standard of Care. CONTRACTOR represents that CONTRACTOR has the qualifications and ability to perform the Services in a professional manner, without the advice, control, or supervision of AUSD. Contractor's services will be performed, findings obtained, reports and recommendations prepared in accordance with generally and currently accepted principles and practices of its profession for services to California school districts.
- 11. Status of Contractor. This is not an employment contract. CONTRACTOR, in the performance of this Agreement, shall be and act as an independent contractor. CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partner, or joint venture of AUSD, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of AUSD and/or to which AUSD's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Workers' Compensation. CONTRACTOR shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state, and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security, and income taxes with respect to CONTRACTOR's employees. In the performance of the work herein contemplated, CONTRACTOR is an independent

contractor or business entity, with the sole authority for controlling and directing the performance of the details of the work. AUSD's interest is only in the results obtained.

- **12.** Assignment. The obligations of CONTRACTOR under this Agreement shall not be assigned by CONTRACTOR without the express prior written consent of AUSD.
- 13. Anti-Discrimination. It is the policy of AUSD that in connection with all work performed under contracts there be no discrimination against any employee engaged in the work because of race, color, ancestry, national origin, religious creed, physical disability, medical condition, marital status, sexual orientation, gender, or age and therefore the CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with applicable federal and California laws including, but not limited to, the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735 and AUSD policy. In addition, the CONTRACTOR agrees to require like compliance by all its subcontractors. Contractor shall not engage in unlawful discrimination in employment on the basis of actual or perceived race, color, national origin, ancestry, religion, age, marital status, pregnancy, physical or mental disability, medical condition, veteran status, gender, sex, or sexual orientation.
- 14. Drug-Free/Smoke Free Policy. No drugs, alcohol, and/or smoking are allowed at any time in any buildings and/or grounds on AUSD property. No students, staff, visitors, CONTRACTORs, or subcontractors are to smoke or use drugs or alcohol on these sites.
- **15. Indemnification.** CONTRACTOR agrees to hold harmless, indemnify, and defend AUSD and its officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims or losses accruing or resulting from injury, damage, or death of any person, firm, or corporation in connection with the performance of this Agreement to the extent such claims or losses are caused by the negligent errors, acts, or omissions of the CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR also agrees to hold harmless, indemnify, and defend AUSD and its elective board, officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims or losses incurred by any supplier, contractor, or subcontractor furnishing work, services, or materials to CONTRACTOR in connection with the performance of the Agreement. This provision survives termination of this Agreement.
- 16. Copyright/Trademark/Patent/Ownership. CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that all matters produced under this Agreement shall become the property of AUSD and cannot be used without AUSD's express written permissions. AUSD shall have all rights, title, and interest in said matters, including the right to secure and maintain the copyright, trademark and/or patent of said matter in the name of AUSD. CONTRACTOR consents to use of CONTRACTOR's name in conjunction with the sale, use, performance, and distribution of the matters, for any purpose and in any medium. These matters include, without limitation, drawings, plans, specifications, studies, reports, memoranda, computation sheets, the contents of computer diskettes, artwork, copy, posters, billboards, photographs, videotapes, audiotapes, systems designs, software, reports, diagrams, surveys, source codes, or any other original works of authorships, or other documents prepared by CONTRACTOR or its subcontractors in connection with the Services performed under this Agreement. All works shall be works for hire as defined under Title 17 of the United States Code, and all copyrights in those works are the property of AUSD.
- 17. Waiver. No delay or omission by either party in exercising any right under this Agreement shall operate as a waiver of that or any other right or prevent a similar subsequent act from constituting a violation of the Agreement.

- 18. Termination. AUSD may at any time terminate this Agreement upon written notice to CONTRACTOR. AUSD shall compensate CONTRACTOR for services satisfactorily provided through the date of termination. In addition, AUSD may terminate this Agreement for cause should CONTRACTOR fail to perform any part of this Agreement. In the event of termination for cause, AUSD may secure the required services from another contractor. If the cost to AUSD exceeds the cost of providing the services pursuant to the Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall pay the additional cost.
- **19.** No Rights in Third Parties. This Agreement does not create any rights in, or inure to the benefit of, any third party except as expressly provided herein.
- 20. AUSD's Evaluation of CONTRACTOR and CONTRACTOR's Employees and/or Subcontractors. AUSD may evaluate the CONTRACTOR's work in any way that AUSD is entitled to do so pursuant to applicable law. The AUSD's evaluation may include, without limitation:
 - **20.1** Requesting that AUSD employee(s) evaluate the CONTRACTOR and the CONTRACTOR's employees and subcontractors and each of their performance.
 - 20.2 Announced and unannounced observance of CONTRACTOR, CONTRACTOR's employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s).
- 21. Limitation of AUSD Liability. Other than as provided in this Agreement, AUSD's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event shall AUSD be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect, or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement for the services performed in connection with this Agreement.
- 22. Confidentiality. The CONTRACTOR and all CONTRACTOR's agents, personnel, employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s) shall maintain the confidentiality of all information received in the course of performing the Services. CONTRACTOR understands that student records are confidential and agree to comply with all state and federal laws concerning the maintenance and disclosure of student records. This requirement to maintain confidentiality shall extend beyond the termination of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR will be permitted access to student data only where permissible under state and federal law and only after executing AUSD's Confidentiality Agreement Regarding Student Data.
- 23. Conflict of Interest. CONTRACTOR shall abide by and be subject to all applicable AUSD policies, regulations, statutes or other laws regarding conflict of interest. CONTRACTOR shall not hire any officer or employee of AUSD to perform any service by this Agreement. CONTRACTOR affirms to the best of his/her/its knowledge, there exists no actual or potential conflict of interest between CONTRACTOR's family, business or financial interest and the services provided under this Agreement, and in the event of change in either private interest or services under this Agreement, any question regarding possible conflict of interest which may arise as a result of such change will be brought to AUSD's attention in writing. Through its execution of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR acknowledges that it is familiar with the provisions of Section 1090 *et seq.* and Section 87100 *et seq.* of the Government Code of the State of California, and certifies that it does not know of any facts which constitute a violation of said provisions, CONTRACTOR agrees it shall notify AUSD of this information.

- 24. Integration/Entire Agreement of Parties. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations, and agreements, whether oral or written. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by both Parties.
- **25.** Litigation. This Agreement shall be performed in Alameda, California and is governed by the laws of the State of California. The Alameda County Superior Court shall have jurisdiction over any state court litigation initiated to enforce or interpret this Agreement. If litigation is initiated, the prevailing party shall be entitled to reasonable attorney's fees and costs.
- 26. Agreement Contingent on Governing Board Approval. The District shall not be bound by the terms of this Agreement until it has been formally approved or ratified by the District's Governing Board, and no payment shall be owed or made to CONTRACTOR absent formal approval.
- 27. Signature Authority. Each party has the full power and authority to enter into and perform the Agreement and the person signing this Agreement on behalf of each party has been given the proper authority and empowered to enter into this Agreement.
- **28.** Counterparts. This Agreement and all amendments and supplements to it may be executed in counterparts, and all counterparts together shall be construed as one document.
- **29.** Incorporation of Recitals and Exhibits. The Recitals and each Exhibit attached hereto are hereby incorporated herein by reference.

In any event, we would not substantially change our scope of work or exceed our budget estimate without your prior authorization. Contra Costa County Office of Education Teacher Induction Program and Alameda Unified School District

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING (MOU) for the CCCOE Teacher Induction Program

July 1, 2017 – June 30, 2018

This is a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Contra Costa County Office of Education (CCCOE) Teacher Induction Program and Alameda Unified School District in partnership to carry out the CCCOE Teacher Induction Program and guidelines of SB 2042. The purpose of this MOU is to establish a formal working relationship between the CCCOE and Alameda Unified School District and to set forth the operative conditions that will govern this partnership.

The goal of this partnership is to increase student achievement through the implementation of a quality teacher induction program, while nurturing the growth and development of participating General Education teachers and Education Specialist teachers in Alameda Unified School District in a sustained and systemic manner.

The partnership will assess itself biannually, based on the agreed-upon outcomes. It is expected that measurable progress will be demonstrated in order to continue the partnership. Assuming that the partnership demonstrates measurable progress, and receives continued funding, the partnership will be maintained.

ANTICIPATED OUTCOMES OF THIS AGREEMENT:

- The CCCOE will partner with Alameda Unified School District in conducting an induction program to support first and second year new teachers that meets all state requirements for Induction programs and will integrate the program design as outlined in this MOU.
- Alameda Unified School District will, when possible, create a cadre of experienced new teacher support mentors. These support mentors will possess a high level of training and leadership ability and will contribute to Alameda Unified School District as instructional leaders.
- Alameda Unified School District's teacher evaluation and professional development programs will reflect the *California Standards for the Teaching Profession (CSTP)*.
- Alameda Unified School District will fully implement the program design incorporating all the necessary support and resources to ensure that participating teachers have every opportunity to successfully complete the induction program to receive their professional credential.

THE CCCOE TEACHER INDUCTION PROGRAM AGREES TO:

- 1. Provide a Teacher Induction Program Coordinator who fulfills the roles and responsibilities outlined in the Induction Program Handbook.
- 2. Consult with Alameda Unified School District (including administration, teacher representatives and other stakeholders) in reviewing the school's needs and resources in relation to new teacher induction.
- 3. Consult with Alameda Unified School District in *developing* and/or revising program design and interfacing with the CA Commission on Teacher Credentialing to support participating teachers to receive a Professional Clear Credential.
- 4. Assist Alameda Unified School District in the recruitment and selection of new teacher mentors according to the California Induction Program Preconditions and Induction Standards and hiring guidelines.
- 5. Work with Alameda Unified School District to insure that its efforts are coordinated with and complementary to other school improvement initiatives.
- 6. Design and deliver seminars for participating teachers insuring that those seminars are rigorous, tied to the CSTP and to content-based, research-based, and grade-level specific approaches to instruction in academic content areas. The seminars are also designed to assist teachers in using technology to support student learning, supporting equity, diversity and access to core curriculum, creating a supportive and healthy environment for student learning, and teaching English Learners and Special Populations of students. Specially designed seminars are offered for Education Specialists facilitated by Contra Costa Special Education Local Planning Area Coordinators and Program Specialists.
- 7. Consult with Alameda Unified School District in the design of teacher recruitment and professional development programs related to teacher induction.
- 8. Make available and advise participating teachers of an Early Completion option for "experienced and exceptional" candidates who meet the program's established criteria.
- 9. Participate in an Induction Program Director network in support of teacher induction programs.
- 10. Provide new teachers with networking and professional development opportunities within the Contra Costa County region.
- 11. Provide training programs, materials and publications to support the above.
- 12. Facilitate research and evaluation activities in order to inform the partnership.
- 13. Provide a linkage for state and local Induction Programs and fulfill state requirements for an Induction Program.

ALAMEDA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AGREES TO:

- 1. Designate a coordinator (who holds an administrative position). The coordinator will represent the district on the Leadership Team and support orientation, new teacher portfolio mid-year review, and end of the year colloquium activities for their participating teachers.
- 2. Support each qualified CCCOE Teacher Induction new teacher with a trained mentor, assigned within the first 30 days of the teacher's enrollment in the program.
- 3. Support each qualified CCCOE Teacher Induction new special education teacher with a mentor who holds the same credential as the participating teacher.
- 4. Submit a final list of participating teachers and mentors to CCCOE by October 1, 2017.
- 5. Pay a service fee to CCCOE for Teacher Induction services: Provide \$2,000 per participating teacher (if Alameda Unified School District is providing the mentor) OR provide \$4,000 per participating teacher (if CCCOE is providing the mentor) for each year of the teacher's participation.
- 6. Pay half of the amount by February 15, 2018. Pay the balance of the amount by May 30, 2018. A late fee of 1% per month will be applied to accounts 30 days past due.
- 7. Insure that the Alameda Unified School District's new teacher support program includes the following elements or the equivalent:
 - At least one hour per week of individualized support/mentoring coordinated and/or planned by the mentor
 - Coaching activities deliberately designed to provide teachers multiple opportunities to demonstrate growth in the *California Standards for the Teaching Profession*
 - A focus on grade-level and content-specific approaches to raising student achievement
 - An Individualized Learning Plan, including an Inquiry Action Plan, designed and implemented solely for the teacher's professional growth and not for evaluation.
 - Individualized Learning Plan goals collaboratively developed by the teacher and mentor, in consultation with the site administrator, within the first 60 days of enrollment
 - Ongoing formative assessment of participating teacher development
 - The use of multiple data sources, such as formative assessment and professional development tools.
- 8. Insure full cooperation and participation in program activities to include as appropriate:
 - Trainings for mentors
 - Mentor attendance at mentor seminars during the year
 - Individual coaching of mentors and other program-related personnel
 - Trainings and meetings for office administrators and site administrators
 - Professional development for participating teachers
 - On-line communication and coordination

- 9. Insure that all participating teachers and all leaders in the following roles sign the appropriate program commitment form: coordinator, site administrator, and mentor.
- 10. Conduct and participate in program evaluation and research activities, to include a Program Mid-year and End of the Year Survey.
- 11. Provide professional resources required for program implementation beyond those provided by the Induction Program.
- 12. Take organizational action to insure that the program of new teacher support is sustained.
- Hold harmless: Both parties agree to indemnify, defend, and save harmless the other from any and all claims and losses resulting from the action of either organization's employees for any activity undertaken in this contract.
- > Termination:
- In the event that either party does not fulfill the terms of this agreement in a timely manner, the other party may terminate this agreement with a 30-day written notice to the breaching party.
- □ In the event that either party determines this agreement is no longer to be bound by the terms, termination may be made with a 30-day prior notice to the date of termination.

WHEREAS, adult schools provide critical opportunities to bring recent dropouts back to school; and

WHEREAS, adult schools provide instruction to those in the state who need English as a second language and citizenship courses and play a key role in immigrant integration and the path to United States citizenship, which is important for our diverse community during this time of immigration reform; and

WHEREAS, adult schools, which recognize that we must focus on educating parents in order to break the cycle of illiteracy and to support educational equity for all our children, provide programs in family literacy at elementary schools in conjunction with community-based organizations; and

WHEREAS, historically, adult schools have been called on to assist the state as it dealt with significant social, political, and economic issues, such as providing job training programs during the Great Depression and training for skilled and under skilled workers during World War II; and

WHEREAS, in 2015, the Legislature and Governor Edmund G. Brown Jr. saved California adult schools from the brink of closure by establishing the Adult Education Block Grant program that is helping to restore access and programming for adult learners with planning and collaboration on a regional scale; now

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ADDENDUM NO. 1648 TO AGREEMENT FOR ARCHITECTURAL SERVICES

At your request, we are pleased to offer this proposal to Alameda Unified School District to access the funding available to the district through the Proposition 39 - California Clean Energy Jobs Act. This proposal is for services covering your funding allocations for fiscal years 2014-15 through 2017-18. As discussed, this proposal is to provide assistance in completing and submitting the P39 energy expenditure plans (EEP's) as required to encumber the remaining balance of AUSD's Prop 39 funding allotments (approximately \$1,690,000 per the attached schedule). We discussed that the charter schools are treated as stand-alone LEA's and thus each must be submitted separately. Thus, it appears there will be 4 EEP applications in all:

- One for ACLC/NEA
- One for AOA
- AOA Elementary School
- One for AUSD remaining (non-charter) sites

(refer to the attached schedule from the CDE website)

Since the EEP for AUSD (non-charter) sites can be inclusive of any of the sites in the current implementation plan (other than charter schools), we will look first at Alameda High School. It may be that the entire district-wide allotment can be captured there. We will know after we run the costs.

Professional Services Agreement

This Agreement is entered into between the Alameda Unified School District (AUSD) and <u>RO Health</u>, Inc. (CONTRACTOR). AUSD is authorized by Government Code Section 53060 to contract for the furnishing of special services and advice in financial, economic, account, engineering, legal, and administrative matters with persons specially trained, experienced, and competent to perform such services. CONTRACTOR is specially trained, experienced, and competent to provide such services. The parties agree as follows:

1. Services. The CONTRACTOR shall provide the following services:

This contracted Registered Nurse role will serve to organize, coordinate and implement the district health services program. They will train and support the Health Office Assistants, and act as a liaison between the district and other health agencies.

Terms. CONTRACTOR shall commence work on January 25, 2017 _____, or the day immediately following approval by an executive cabinet member, if the total amount the CONTRACTOR has contracted with the District is below \$87,800 in the current fiscal year, or the Board of Education if total Agreement equals or exceeds \$87,800, whichever is later. All contracts over \$25,000 must be presented to the Board of Education for approval within sixty (60) days of work commencing. The work shall be completed no later than June 30, 2017

3. Compensation. Check one of the following boxes:

This sum shall be for full performance of this Agreement and includes fees, costs, and expenses incurred by CONTRACTOR including, but not limited to labor, materials, taxes, profit, overhead, travel, insurance, subcontractor costs, and other costs.

- 3.1 CONTRACTOR is providing services for a flat fee which shall not exceed \$_____.
- **3.2** CONTRACTOR will be compensated at an hourly rate. Contractor will provide a maximum of hours of service at a rate of \$58.60 per hour for a total not to exceed \$42,000.00.
- 3.3 🛛 Other: ____

AUSD shall not be liable to CONTRACTOR for any costs or expenses paid or incurred or equipment, materials or supplies used by CONTRACTOR in performing services for AUSD, except as follows:

Payment for the work shall be made for all undisputed amounts in monthly installment payments within forty-five (45) days after the CONTRACTOR submits an invoice to AUSD for work actually completed and after AUSD's written approval of the work, or the portion of the work for which payment is to be made.

The granting of any payment by AUSD or the recipient thereof by CONTRACTOR, shall in no way lessen the liability of CONTRACTOR to correct unsatisfactory work, although the unsatisfactory character of that work may not have been apparent or detected at the time a payment was made. Work, which does not conform to the requirements of this Agreement, may be rejected by District and in that case must be replaced by CONTRACTOR without delay.

4. Strategic Alignment. Check one of the following boxes:

- 4.1 School-based Agreements: How does this service support your academic goals and increase student achievement as described in the Board-approved School Site Plan?

- 5.2 Fingerprinting of Employees and Agents. The fingerprinting and criminal background investigation requirements of Education Code Section 45125.1 apply to CONTRACTOR's services under this Agreement and CONTRACTOR certifies its compliance with these provisions as follows: "CONTRACTOR has complied with the fingerprinting and criminal background investigation requirements of Education Code Section 45125.1 with respect to all CONTRACTOR's employees, subcontractors, agents, and subcontractors' employees or agents ("Employees") regardless of whether those Employees are paid or unpaid, concurrently employed by AUSD or acting as independent contractors of CONTRACTOR, who may have contact with AUSD pupils in the course of providing services pursuant to the Agreement, and the California Department of Justice has determined that none of those Employees has been convicted of a felony, as that term is defined in Education Code Section 45122.1. CONTRACTOR further certifies that it has received and reviewed fingerprint results for each of its Employees and CONTRACTOR has requested and reviewed subsequent arrest records for all Employees who may come into contact with AUSD pupils in providing services to the District under this Agreement." See added Clause No. 34 on page 7.
 - 5.2.1 Gringerprint Clearance will be completed through the AUSD Human Resources Department prior to starting work.

5.2.2 Waiver of Fingerprint Requirement. CONTRACTOR is not required to comply with section 7.2 because CONTRACTOR's services are of limited duration and District employees will directly supervise CONTRACTOR at all times that CONTRACTOR is in the presence of students.

- 5.3 Removal of CONTRACTOR's Employee(s). In the event that AUSD, in its sole discretion, at any time during the term of this Agreement, desires the removal of any CONTRACTOR related persons, employee, representative, or agent from an AUSD school site and/or property, CONTRACTOR shall immediately upon receiving notice from AUSD of such desire, cause the removal of such person or persons.
- Insurance. CONTRACTOR will provide AUSD with evidence of the following insurance coverage prior to commencing the work under this Agreement:
 - 6.1 Workers' Compensation Insurance. Check one of the following boxes. If CONTRACTOR employs any person to perform work in connection with this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall procure and maintain at all times during the performance of such work, Workers' Compensation Insurance in conformance with the laws of the State of California and Federal laws when applicable. Employers' Liability Insurance shall not be less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per accident or disease.

Check only one of the boxes below:

- The CONTRACTOR is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the Labor Code which requires every employer to be insured against liability for Workers' Compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that Code, and will comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the work of this Agreement.

The policy shall protect CONTRACTOR and AUSD in the same manner as though each were separately issued. Nothing in said policy shall operate to increase the insurer's liability as set forth in the policy beyond the amount or amounts shown or to which the insurer would have been liable if only one interest were named as an insured.
- 6.3 Professional Liability Insurance. If CONTRACTOR is offering AUSD professional advice under this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall maintain errors and omissions insurance or professional liability insurance with coverage limits of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per claim.
 - 6.3.1 Waiver of Insurance. CONTRACTOR is not required to maintain any insurance under this Agreement. Waiver of insurance does not release CONTRACTOR from responsibility for any claim or demand.

Notice shall be effective when received if personally served or, if mailed, three days after mailing. Either party must give written notice of a change in address. CONTRACTOR shall submit invoices in a form that includes the name of the person providing the service, the service performed, the date service was rendered, and the hours spent on the work.

- 8. Invoicing. Invoices furnished by CONTRACTOR under this Agreement must be in a form acceptable to AUSD. All amounts paid by AUSD shall be subject to audit by AUSD.
 - 8.1 Invoice shall include but not be limited to: Consultant name, consultant address, invoice date, invoice sequence number, purchase order number, name of school or department service was provided to, period of service, number of hours of service, brief description of services provided, hourly rate, and total payment requested.
 - 8.2 In addition, unless specifically waived by AUSD as set forth above, invoices from Agencies or Organizations must include evidence of compliance with section 7 herein.
- 9. Licenses and Permits. CONTRACTOR shall obtain and keep in force all licenses, permits, and certificates necessary for the performance of this Agreement.

10. Contractor Qualifications / Performance of Services.

- 10.1 Contractor Qualifications. CONTRACTOR is specially trained, experienced, competent and fully licensed to provide the Services required by this Agreement in conformity with the laws and regulations of the State of California, the United States of America, and all local laws, ordinances and regulations, as they may apply.
- 10.2 Standard of Care. CONTRACTOR represents that CONTRACTOR has the qualifications and ability to perform the Services in a professional manner, without the advice, control, or supervision of AUSD. Contractor's services will be performed, findings obtained, reports and recommendations prepared in accordance with generally and currently accepted principles and practices of its profession for services to California school districts.
- 11. Status of Contractor. This is not an employment contract. CONTRACTOR, in the performance of this Agreement, shall be and act as an independent contractor. CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees, agents, partner, or joint venture of AUSD, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of AUSD and/or to which AUSD's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Workers' Compensation. CONTRACTOR shall assume full responsibility for payment of all federal, state, and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security, and income taxes with respect to CONTRACTOR's employees. In the performance of the work herein contemplated, CONTRACTOR is an independent

contractor or business entity, with the sole authority for controlling and directing the performance of the details of the work. AUSD's interest is only in the results obtained.

- 12. Assignment. The obligations of CONTRACTOR under this Agreement shall not be assigned by CONTRACTOR without the express prior written consent of AUSD.
- 13. Anti-Discrimination. It is the policy of AUSD that in connection with all work performed under contracts there be no discrimination against any employee engaged in the work because of race, color, ancestry, national origin, religious creed, physical disability, medical condition, marital status, sexual orientation, gender, or age and therefore the CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with applicable federal and California laws including, but not limited to, the California Fair Employment and Housing Act beginning with Government Code Section 12900 and Labor Code Section 1735 and AUSD policy. In addition, the CONTRACTOR agrees to require like compliance by all its subcontractors. Contractor shall not engage in unlawful discrimination in employment on the basis of actual or perceived race, color, national origin, ancestry, religion, age, marital status, pregnancy, physical or mental disability, medical condition, veteran status, gender, sex, or sexual orientation.
- 14. Drug-Free/Smoke Free Policy. No drugs, alcohol, and/or smoking are allowed at any time in any buildings and/or grounds on AUSD property. No students, staff, visitors, CONTRACTORs, or subcontractors are to smoke or use drugs or alcohol on these sites.
- 15. Indemnification. CONTRACTOR agrees to hold harmless, indemnify, and defend AUSD and its officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims or losses accruing or resulting from injury, damage, or death of any person, firm, or corporation in connection with the performance of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR also agrees to hold harmless, indemnify, and defend AUSD and its elective board, officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims or losses incurred by any supplier, contractor, or subcontractor furnishing work, services, or materials to CONTRACTOR in connection with the performance of the Agreement. This provision survives termination of this Agreement.

CLIENT agrees to indemnify and hold harmless RO health, its officers and employees from all actions asserted in connection with the negligent performance of CLIENT, its officers and employees.

- 16. Copyright/Trademark/Patent/Ownership. CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that all matters produced under this Agreement shall become the property of AUSD and cannot be used without AUSD's express written permissions. AUSD shall have all rights, title, and interest in said matters, including the right to secure and maintain the copyright, trademark and/or patent of said matter in the name of AUSD. CONTRACTOR consents to use of CONTRACTOR's name in conjunction with the sale, use, performance, and distribution of the matters, for any purpose and in any medium. These matters include, without limitation, drawings, plans, specifications, studies, reports, memoranda, computation sheets, the contents of computer diskettes, artwork, copy, posters, billboards, photographs, videotapes, audiotapes, systems designs, software, reports, diagrams, surveys, source codes, or any other original works of authorships, or other documents prepared by CONTRACTOR or its subcontractors in connection with the Services performed under this Agreement. All works shall be works for hire as defined under Title 17 of the United States Code, and all copyrights in those works are the property of AUSD.
- 17. Waiver. No delay or omission by either party in exercising any right under this Agreement shall operate as a waiver of that or any other right or prevent a similar subsequent act from constituting a violation of the Agreement.

- 18. Termination. AUSD may at any time terminate this Agreement upon written notice to CONTRACTOR. AUSD shall compensate CONTRACTOR for services satisfactorily provided through the date of termination. In addition, AUSD may terminate this Agreement for cause should CONTRACTOR fail to perform any part of this Agreement. In the event of termination for cause, AUSD may secure the required services from another contractor. If the cost to AUSD exceeds the cost of providing the services pursuant to the Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall pay the additional cost.
- 19. No Rights in Third Parties. This Agreement does not create any rights in, or inure to the benefit of, any third party except as expressly provided herein.
- 20. AUSD's Evaluation of CONTRACTOR and CONTRACTOR's Employees and/or Subcontractors. AUSD may evaluate the CONTRACTOR's work in any way that AUSD is entitled to do so pursuant to applicable law. The AUSD's evaluation may include, without limitation:
 - 20.1 Requesting that AUSD employee(s) evaluate the CONTRACTOR and the CONTRACTOR's employees and subcontractors and each of their performance.
 - 20.2 Announced and unannounced observance of CONTRACTOR, CONTRACTOR's employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s).
- 21. Limitation of AUSD Liability. Other than as provided in this Agreement, AUSD's financial obligations under this Agreement shall be limited to the payment of the compensation provided in this Agreement. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, in no event shall AUSD be liable, regardless of whether any claim is based on contract or tort, for any special, consequential, indirect, or incidental damages, including, but not limited to, lost profits or revenue, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement for the services performed in connection with this Agreement.
- 22. Confidentiality. The CONTRACTOR and all CONTRACTOR's agents, personnel, employee(s), and/or subcontractor(s) shall maintain the confidentiality of all information received in the course of performing the Services. CONTRACTOR understands that student records are confidential and agree to comply with all state and federal laws concerning the maintenance and disclosure of student records. This requirement to maintain confidentiality shall extend beyond the termination of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR will be permitted access to student data only where permissible under state and federal law and only after executing AUSD's Confidentiality Agreement Regarding Student Data.
- 23. Conflict of Interest. CONTRACTOR shall abide by and be subject to all applicable AUSD policies, regulations, statutes or other laws regarding conflict of interest. CONTRACTOR shall not hire any officer or employee of AUSD to perform any service by this Agreement. CONTRACTOR affirms to the best of his/her/its knowledge, there exists no actual or potential conflict of interest between CONTRACTOR's family, business or financial interest and the services provided under this Agreement, and in the event of change in either private interest or services under this Agreement, any question regarding possible conflict of interest which may arise as a result of such change will be brought to AUSD's attention in writing. Through its execution of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR acknowledges that it is familiar with the provisions of Section 1090 *et seq.* and Section 87100 *et seq.* of the Government Code of the State of California, and certifies that it does not know of any facts which constitute a violation of said provisions, CONTRACTOR agrees it shall notify AUSD of this information.

- 24. Integration/Entire Agreement of Parties. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties and supersedes all prior discussions, negotiations, and agreements, whether oral or written. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by a written instrument executed by both Parties.
- 25. Litigation. This Agreement shall be performed in Alameda, California and is governed by the laws of the State of California. The Alameda County Superior Court shall have jurisdiction over any state court litigation initiated to enforce or interpret this Agreement. If litigation is initiated, the prevailing party shall be entitled to reasonable attorney's fees and costs.
- 26. Agreement Contingent on Governing Board Approval. The District shall not be bound by the terms of this Agreement until it has been formally approved or ratified by the District's Governing Board, and no payment shall be owed or made to CONTRACTOR absent formal approval.
- 27. Signature Authority. Each party has the full power and authority to enter into and perform the Agreement and the person signing this Agreement on behalf of each party has been given the proper authority and empowered to enter into this Agreement.
- 28. Counterparts. This Agreement and all amendments and supplements to it may be executed in counterparts, and all counterparts together shall be construed as one document.
- 29. Incorporation of Recitals and Exhibits. The Recitals and each Exhibit attached hereto are hereby incorporated herein by reference.
- 30. Other. Additional terms set forth in this paragraph 31- 35 must be approved by AUSD General Counsel:

31. URGENT PERSONNEL REQUESTS.

If CLIENT requests personnel less than two (2) hours prior to the start of the shift, RO HEALTH shall bill CLIENT for the entire duration of the shift, as long as RO HEALTH personnel report for work within a reasonable period of time.

32. SCHEDULED PERSONNEL CANCELATION.

4. The District may terminate this agreement and be relieved of the payment of any consideration to Contractor should Contractor fail to perform the covenants herein contained at the time and in the manner herein provided. 12. A Certificate of Insurance is required that must include the following coverage:

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LEASE AGREEMENT

Bay Farm, Earhart, Edison, Franklin, Lum and Otis (SCHOOL SITE)

THIS LEASE AGREEMENT ("Lease") is made on this 27th day of August 2013 ("Effective Date"), by and between the Alameda Unified School District, a California public school district ("District"), and Girls Inc. of the Island City ("Tenant").

RECITALS:

WHEREAS, District owns that real property constituting the Bay Farm, Earhart, Edison, Franklin, Lum and Otis School sites, located in Alameda, California ("School Site"), which is further described on Exhibit "A" attached hereto;

WHEREAS, Tenant is a non-profit organization that desires to operate a before and afterschool program at the School Sites, and Tenant desires to lease a portion of the School Sites from the District for the purposes more particularly described in Exhibit "B" hereto ("Premises");

WHEREAS, District operates an Elementary school program at the School Sites;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Education Code section 17077.40 and section 17527, et seq., District is authorized to enter into joint use agreements "to make vacant classrooms or other space in operating school buildings available . . . to other school districts, educational agencies, except private educational institutions which maintain kindergarten or grades 1 to 12, inclusive, governmental units, nonprofit organizations, community agencies, professional agencies, commercial and noncommercial firms, corporations, partnerships, businesses, and individuals ...";

WHEREAS, Education Code sections 17527 through 17538 authorize the governing board of any school district to enter into a lease for the joint use of operating school property if the joint use does not (1) interfere with the educational program or activities of the school, (2) unduly disrupt residents in the surrounding neighborhood, or (3) jeopardize the safety of school children;

WHEREAS, District, pursuant to section 17529 of the Education Code, has determined that permitting Tenant to jointly use the Premises will not (1) interfere with the educational programs or activities of any school or class conducted on the School Site, (2) unduly disrupt the residents in the surrounding neighborhood, or (3) jeopardize the safety of the children at the School Site;

WHEREAS, District desires to lease the Premises to Tenant upon the terms and conditions set forth herein; and

WHEREAS, the District's Governing Board ("Board") has authorized this Lease by its Resolution No. N/A.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the covenants and agreements hereinafter set forth, District and Tenant agree as follows:

AGREEMENT:

1. <u>LEASE OF PREMISES</u>. District does hereby lease to Tenant the Premises, including all improvements located thereon, , as shown in Exhibit "C" attached hereto.

2. <u>TERM</u>.

A. The term of the Lease shall be for the 2016-2017 school year, commencing on July 1, 2016 ("Commencement Date") and expiring on June 30, 2017 ("Term").

B. At District's sole discretion, this Lease may be extended on mutually agreed upon terms and conditions beyond the term described in section 2.A for an additional one (1) year term; provided the District can make the requisite Joint Use findings as required by the Education Code.

C. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Lease, District shall have the right to terminate the Lease at any time if one or more of the School Sites are needed by the District for public school purposes, and the District shall give the tenant at least six (6) months advance notice of such termination.

D. This Lease is subject to the District's reservation of the use of the Premises daily from 7:00 am to 6:00 pm each school day. District and Tenant understand and agree that District's use of the Premises on short notice and on an "as-needed basis" is a material condition of this Lease. District shall have the absolute right, in its sole discretion, to use the Premises for all or any part of any day in which school is in session, providing that alternative on-site space is available that meets Tenant's licensing and enrollment requirements. District's right to use the Premises may be exercised by its giving Tenant either verbal or written notice at least five business days in advance of the time that District wishes to commence its use of the Premises. Tenant's failure to surrender the Premises in such circumstances shall constitute grounds for District's termination of this Lease.

3. <u>PURPOSE OF LEASE</u>. The purpose of this Lease is for District to provide Tenant the use of the Premises for operation of its before and after school program for children enrolled in Alameda Schools and who are between 4 and 12 years of age (the "Program").

4. <u>RENT</u>.

A. For and in consideration of the use of the Premises, Tenant shall pay a daily rate of nine hundred and thirty six dollars (\$936.00) total for all sites. This amounts to an annual total of fifty three thousand three hundred and fifty two dollars (\$52,352.00) for classrooms at six sites. Rent for the first month shall be due upon commencement of this Lease. Thereafter, rent shall be due on the first of each month until the expiration or termination of this Lease.

B. This Section left intentionally blank.

C. Tenant shall pay promptly to District, the monthly Rent on the first day of each month in advance during the Term of the Lease, without deduction, setoff, prior notice or demand.

D. The monthly installment of Rent will be adjusted annually based on usage, effective on July 1 of each year, for each succeeding year beyond the initial year.

E. Tenant acknowledges that late payment by Tenant to District of the Rent and other sums due hereunder will cause District to incur costs not contemplated by this Lease, the exact amount of which will be extremely difficult to ascertain. Such costs include, but are not limited to, processing and accounting charges. Accordingly, if District does not receive any installment of Rent or any other sum due from Tenant by 4:00 p.m. within ten (10) days after such amount is due, Tenant shall pay to District, as additional Rent, a late charge equal to five percent (5%) of such overdue amount or the maximum amount allowed by law, whichever is less. The parties hereby agree that such late charges represent a fair and reasonable estimate of the costs District will incur by reason of late payment by Tenant. Acceptance of such late charge by District shall in no event constitute a waiver of Tenant's default with respect to such overdue amount, nor prevent District from exercising any of its other rights and remedies granted hereunder.

5. <u>SECURITY DEPOSIT.</u>

A. Amount of Security Deposit. Upon execution of this Lease, Tenant shall deposit with District N/A Dollars (\$0.00), hereafter referred to as "Security Deposit."

Uses of Security Deposit. The Security Deposit shall secure the timely, full and Β. faithful performance by Tenant of each term, covenant and condition of this Lease. If at any time Tenant shall fail to make any payment or fail to keep or perform any term, covenant or condition on its part to be made or performed or kept under this Lease, without waiving or releasing Tenant from any obligation under this Lease, District may, but shall not be obligated to use, apply or retain the whole or any part of the Security Deposit: (a) to the extent of any sum due to District; (b) to make any required payment on Tenant's behalf; and/or (c) to compensate District for any loss, damage, attorneys' fees or expense sustained by District due to Tenant's default, it being expressly understood that the Security Deposit shall not be considered an advance payment of Rent or a measure of District's damages in case of default by Tenant. In such event, Tenant shall, within five (5) days of written demand by District, remit to District sufficient funds to restore the Security Deposit to its original sum. No interest shall accrue on the Security Deposit. District shall not be deemed a trustee of the Security Deposit, and may commingle the Security Deposit with its other funds. Should Tenant comply with all the terms, covenants, and conditions of this Lease and at the end of the term of this Lease leave the School Site in the condition required by this Lease, then the Security Deposit, less any sums owing to District, shall be returned to Tenant within thirty (30) days after the expiration or earlier termination of this Lease and vacancy of the School Site by Tenant.

C. Impermissible Use of Security Deposit. Tenant may not apply the security deposit to any Rent due under this Lease. If District sells or assigns the leased premises, District shall have the right to transfer the security deposit to the new owner or assignee to hold under this Lease, and upon so doing District shall be released from all liability to Tenant for return of the Security Deposit.

6. <u>DELIVERY AND CONDITION OF PREMISES</u>.

A. Delivery. District shall deliver to Tenant on the Commencement Date the actual and possession of the Premises, clear of all tenancies and occupancies. If for any reason District cannot deliver possession of the Premises to Tenant on the Commencement Date, District shall not be subject to any liability therefore except as described in this section, nor shall District's failure to deliver the Premises affect the validity of this Lease or the obligations of Tenant hereunder or extend the term hereof, but in such case, Tenant shall not be obligated to pay any rent hereunder until possession of the Premises is tendered to Tenant.

B. Condition of Premises. The Premises are leased to Tenant on an "AS IS" basis. District shall not be required to make or construct any alterations including structural changes, additions or improvements to the Premises. By entry and taking possession of the Premises pursuant to this Lease, Tenant accepts the Premises in "AS IS" condition. Tenant acknowledges that neither the District nor District's agents have made any representation or warranty as to the suitability of the Premises to the conduct of Tenant's business. Any agreements, warranties or representations not expressly contained herein shall in no way bind either District or Tenant, and District and Tenant expressly waive all claims for damages by reason of any statement, representation, warranty, promise or agreement, if any, not contained in this Lease.

7. <u>USE OF PREMISES</u>.

Tenant shall use the Premises solely for the purpose of operating the Program. A. Tenant shall not use the Premises for any use other than that specified in section 3, this section, and Exhibit B without the prior written consent of the District. Tenant agrees to maintain the Premises and to conduct the Program in a manner that meets all federal, state and local regulations relating to the Premises and to the operation of the Program, and to comply with all federal, state and local laws, regulations and ordinances, now or hereafter enacted concerning the Premises, the use of the Premises, and/or the Program. The execution of this Lease shall be subject to the Tenant obtaining any and all permits or approvals which may be required in order for the Tenant to operate the Program on the Premises. Tenant shall obtain all requisite licenses before commencing operations and shall maintain all requisite licenses in force throughout the Lease Term. Tenant shall not use or permit the Premises to be used in whole or in part during the Term of this Lease for any purpose or use in violation of the laws or ordinances applicable thereto. Tenant shall indemnify, defend, and hold District harmless against any loss, expense, damage, attorneys' fees or liability arising out of failure of Tenant to comply with any applicable law, regulation, rule or ordinance. Tenant shall not commit or suffer to be committed, any waste upon the Premises, or allow any sale by auction upon the Premises, or allow the Premises to be used for any unlawful purpose, or place any loads upon the floor, walls or ceiling which endanger the structure, or place any harmful liquids in the plumbing, sewer or storm water drainage system of the Premises. No waste materials or refuse shall be dumped upon or permitted to remain upon any part of the Premises except in trash containers designated for that purpose. Any uses that involve the serving and/or sale of alcoholic beverages and the conducting of games of chance are prohibited on the Premises. Tenant shall comply with the District-wide policy prohibiting the use of tobacco products on the Premises at all times. Tenant shall not use or permit the use of the Premises or any part thereof for any purpose that is inimical to public morals and welfare or morally objectionable as unsuitable for a public educational facility. Tenant agrees to immediately respond to concerns expressed by neighbors or District relating to the operation of the Premises.

B. If required, Tenant and all subtenants shall obtain a use permit from the City of Alameda for Tenant's use throughout the Term of this Lease. Tenant shall require all subtenants, licensees, and invitees, to use the Premises only in conformance with the permitted use and with applicable governmental laws, regulations, rules and ordinances.

C. Tenant represents that it is qualified to administer and operate the Program. Tenant shall be solely responsible for the administration and operation of the Program, including the hiring of all employees. Tenant shall be responsible for verifying the qualifications, credentials, certificates, and licenses of its staff, agents, consultants and/or subcontractors who may provide services in conjunction with Tenant's activities on the Premises.

D. Tenant shall vacate the premises during school fire drills.

8. <u>FINGERPRINTING AND CRIMINAL BACKGROUND VERIFICATION</u>.

If Tenant uses any portion of the Premises during school hours, Tenant shall be responsible for ensuring compliance with all applicable fingerprinting and criminal background investigation requirements for its employees described in Education Code section 45125.1, which may be met under the fingerprinting provisions of Title 22 of the California Code of Regulations and applicable provisions of the California Health and Safety Code relevant to community care facility licensing (Health & Safety Code, § 1500 et seq.). Tenant shall provide written verification of compliance with the aforementioned fingerprinting and criminal background investigation requirements to District prior to each individual's commencement of employment or participation in Tenant's Program and prior to permitting contact with any pupils.

9. <u>INDEMNIFICATION.</u>

A. Tenant Indemnification. Tenant agrees to indemnify, reimburse, hold harmless, and defend District, its trustees, officers, employees and agents against any and all claims, causes of action, judgments, obligations or liabilities, and all reasonable expenses incurred in investigating or resisting the same (including reasonable attorneys' fees), on account of, or arising out of, the operation, condition, use or occupancy of the Premises and all areas appurtenant thereto or from the conduct of Tenant's Program or from any activity, work, or other things done, permitted or suffered by Tenant in or about the Premises. This Lease is made on

the express condition that District shall not be liable for, or suffer loss by reason of, injury to person or property, from whatever cause in any way connected with the condition, use or occupancy of the Premises specifically including, without limitation, any liability for injury to the person or property of the Tenant, its agents, officers, employees, licensees and invitees.

B. Further Tenant Indemnification. Tenant shall further indemnify, hold harmless, and defend District against and from any and all claims arising from any breach or default in the performance of any obligation on Tenant's part to be performed under the terms of this Agreement, or arising from any act, omission or negligence of the Tenant, or any officer, agent, employee, guest, or invitee of Tenant, and from all costs, attorney's fees, and liabilities incurred in or about the defense of any such claim or any action or proceeding brought thereon. If any action or proceeding is brought against District by reason of such claim (regardless of whether a claim is filed), Tenant upon notice from District shall defend the same at Tenant's expense. Tenant shall give prompt written notice to District's Risk Manager in case of casualty or accidents in or on the Premises.

C. Costs to Enforce Indemnification. Any reasonable costs incurred (including filing fees, attorney's fees etc.) after providing written request for indemnification to the indemnifying party for indemnification shall be owed to the requesting party if it is determined the indemnification was owed. In addition the indemnifying party shall pay reasonable attorneys' fees and costs incurred to enforce the indemnity obligations of this agreement to the indemnified party.

10. <u>INSURANCE</u>.

A. Commercial General Liability Insurance and Auto Insurance. Tenant shall, at Tenant's expense, obtain and keep in force during the term of this Lease a policy of commercial general liability insurance and a comprehensive auto liability policy insuring District and Tenant against claims and liabilities arising out of the operation, condition, use, or occupancy of the Premises and all areas appurtenant thereto, including parking areas. Tenant's comprehensive auto liability policy shall insure all vehicle(s), whether hired, owned or non-owned. Tenant's commercial general insurance shall be at least as broad as the Insurance Service Office (ISO) CG 00-01 form and in an amount of not less than Five Million dollars (\$5,000,000) for bodily injury or death and property damage as a result of any one occurrence and a Five Million dollar (\$5,000,000) general aggregate policy limit. In addition, Tenant shall obtain a products/completed operations aggregate policy in the amount of Two Million dollars (\$2,000,000) and a personal injury policy in the amount of One Million dollars (\$1,000,000). The insurance carrier, deductibles and/or self insured retentions shall be approved by District. The deductible/occurrence for said insurance shall not exceed Five Thousand dollars (\$5,000) for any and all losses resulting from negligence, errors and omissions of the Tenant, its Board, officers, agents, employees, invitees and/or students.

B. Fire Insurance. During the term of this Lease, District shall maintain at its cost a policy of standard fire and casualty insurance limited to the value of the buildings and improvements located on the Premises as of the Commencement Date. In the event of loss or damage to the buildings, the leased Premises or any contents, each of the parties hereto, and all Page 6 persons claiming under each of the parties, shall look first to any insurance in its favor before making any claim against the other party, and to the extent possible without adding additional costs, each party shall obtain for each policy of insurance provisions permitting waiver of any claim against the other party for loss or damage within the scope of the insurance and each party, to the extent permitted, for itself and its insurers, waives all such insurance claims against the other party.

C. Workers' Compensation Insurance. During the term of this Lease, Tenant shall comply with all provisions of law applicable to Tenant with respect to obtaining and maintaining workers' compensation insurance.

D. Subtenant Insurance. During the term of this Lease, Tenant shall require any subtenant of all or any portion of the Premises to maintain in effect during the term of its sublease, insurance coverage equivalent to that required to be maintained by Tenant.

E. Tenant's Property Insurance. Tenant acknowledges that the insurance to be maintained by District on the Premises will not insure any of Tenant's property or improvements made by Tenant. Accordingly, Tenant shall, at its own expense, maintain in full force and effect an insurance policy on all of its fixtures, equipment, improvements made by Tenant and personal property in, about, or on the Premises. Said policy is to be for "All Risk" coverage insurance to the extent of at least ninety percent (90%) of the insurable value of Tenant's property.

F. Certificates of Insurance and Endorsements. Prior to the Commencement Date Tenant shall deliver to District a certificate of insurance evidencing the existence of the policies required hereunder and copies of endorsements stating that such policies shall:

(i) not be canceled or altered without thirty (30) days prior written notice to

District;

- ii) insure performance of the indemnity set forth in Sections 9 and 29 D;
- iii) state the coverage is primary and any coverage by District is in excess

thereto;

- iv) contain a cross liability endorsement; and,
- v) include a separate endorsement naming District as an additional insured.

At least thirty (30) days prior to the expiration of each certificate, and every subsequent certificate, Tenant shall deliver to District a new certificate of insurance consistent with all of the terms and conditions required in connection with the original certificate of insurance as described above.

G. Insurance Limits, Rating of Insurers and Certificates. It is the intent of the parties that policy limits set herein shall be raised from time to time during the Term of this Lease to account for (i) increases in Annual Rent for the Premises, (ii) increases in the estimated full replacement cost of the Premises, and (iii) increases in the general marketplace insurance limits for tenancies as defined herein or sub-tenancies consistent with the provisions of this lease. Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best Insurance rating of no less than

A-minus: VII and subject to the approval of District. Tenant shall furnish District with the original certificates and amendatory endorsements effecting coverage required.

H. Mutual Release. Except as set forth in this Lease, Tenant hereby releases the District, and its trustees, officers, agents and employees from any and all claims, demands, loss, expense or injury to the Premises or to the furnishings, fixtures, equipment, inventory or other personal property of Tenant in, about, or upon the Premises, which is caused by perils, events or happenings which are covered by the insurance required by this Lease or which are the subject of insurance carried by Tenant and in force at the time of loss. Tenant shall procure an appropriate clause in, or an endorsement to, all policies required by this Lease or any other insurance policy maintained by Tenant, pursuant to which the insurance company or companies waive subrogation or consent to a waiver of a right of recovery against the District.

11. MAINTENANCE AND REPAIRS.

A. Tenant, at its cost, shall maintain the Premises and the interior of the facilities located thereon in a good condition consistent with the condition of the School Site existing at the time of delivery in accordance with applicable provisions of the Education Code, the implementing regulations and the District's policies and/or practices. Tenant acknowledges and accepts that the Premises are leased in "AS IS" condition.

B. District makes no representations or warranties for the structure of the building as it exists, but subject to the provisions of Section 12, District agrees that if the structural elements of the building become damaged to a lesser condition than currently exists, and if such structural damage is due to no fault or negligence of Tenant, then District will repair the damage in such a manner as to bring it back to a condition which is similar to the condition which exists at the time Tenant takes possession of the Premises; however, District may terminate this Lease if such repair cost exceeds twenty five thousand dollars (\$25,000) per incident. District agrees to pro-rate Tenant's rent during the "repair" period, if the resulting structural damage prohibits Tenant from carrying out its normal daily activities. If District elects not to perform a repair estimated to cost in excess of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), then Tenant may elect to remain in possession of the Premises and pay the stipulated rent unless changed through mutual agreement of the parties or Tenant may elect to terminate this Lease.

C. District shall not be required to maintain, repair or replace the interior spaces including the interior surface of exterior walls. If District is required to perform maintenance that is not District's obligation, Tenant shall reimburse District, as additional rent, within fifteen (15) days after receipt of billing, for the cost of such maintenance and repairs which are the obligation of Tenant hereunder; provided, however, that Tenant shall not be required to reimburse District for the cost of repairs of the structural elements of the building unless such repair is required because of the negligence or willful misconduct of Tenant or its employees, agents, or invitees in which event necessary repairs or replacements shall be charged to Tenant, its agents or clients as additional rent.

D. As used in this Lease, the term "structural elements of the building" are defined as and shall be limited to the foundation, footings, floor slab but not flooring, structural walls Page 8 excluding glass and doors, and the roof excluding skylights. Plumbing, electrical and heating systems shall be considered "structural elements of the building" excluding, however, those repairs and maintenance items which can be completed without wall or floor removal in which case these repairs shall be the responsibility of the Tenant.

E. Except as expressly provided in above, Tenant shall, at its cost, maintain and repair the Premises including the windows, skylights, doors and all door hardware, the walls and partitions, ceilings and all other surfaces visible to public or Tenant and the electrical, plumbing, lighting, heating, ventilating and air conditioning systems in a condition similar to that which exists at the time Tenant takes possession of the Premises. The term "maintain and repair" shall be defined as routine, regular or necessary maintenance. If plumbing, heating, ventilating and electrical systems can be accessed without the removal of walls or floors, repairs and maintenance shall be the Tenant's responsibility. For example, Tenant will be responsible for toilet replacements and clogged toilets, while the District will be responsible for main sewer lines that are clogged, damaged or broken due to no fault of Tenant. Tenant shall have sole and complete responsibility for the cost of maintenance, repair and replacement of the air conditioning systems.

F. District shall have no maintenance or repair obligations with respect to the Premises except as expressly provided in this section. Tenant hereby expressly waives the provisions of Subsection 1 of Section 1932 and Sections 1941 and 1942 of the Civil Code of California and all rights to make repairs at the expense of District as provided in Section 1942 of said Civil Code.

12. <u>ALTERATIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS.</u>

A. With prior written approval of the District, Tenant may, at its sole cost and expense, construct or cause to be constructed on the Premises those improvements which Tenant deems necessary to the operation of its business provided such improvements are subject to local site, zoning, and design review and other required approvals and provided District has approved all such improvements.

B. Requirements. In regard to the improvements constructed on the Premises consistent with the provisions of this Lease, Tenant shall, prior to construction, major repair, renovation or demolition of any improvements on the Premises, obtain the prior written consent of District thereto and to the final plans, specifications, and schedule for completion thereof. Tenant shall also, prior to construction of any improvements, obtain written approval from District and the Division of the State Architect (DSA) for the improvements and their related costs. Said approval or disapproval must be expressly made by District in writing. Tenant agrees to deliver DSA's written approval to District within 10 days after Tenant's receipt. Tenant agrees not to proceed with any construction of improvements until Tenant has obtained District's and DSA's written approvals. District and Tenant recognize that such approvals may be completed in phases, such that Tenant initially requests conceptual approval and, if approved by District, then proceeds to draw the plans and specifications. District shall respond to Tenant with

said approval or disapproval within fifteen (15) days after District receives a written request with architectural plans and drawings from Tenant. District's approval shall be at District's sole and absolute discretion and District may withhold or disapprove of such improvements without reason. As a condition of such approval, District may require that Tenant agree to remove certain improvements and restore the Premises to its original condition upon expiration or earlier termination of this Lease, and/or provide District with adequate security for such removal.

C. Not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the construction, major repair, renovation or demolition of any improvements on the Premises, Tenant shall provide District with information regarding the contractor's financial condition and evidence to District's satisfaction that adequate funds to complete the improvements are committed and available or that completion has been otherwise adequately assured. Such assurances may include, in District's discretion, a completion guarantee. No construction shall commence until District has given Tenant written acceptance of such assurances.

D. Tenant shall give District fifteen (15) days prior written notice before commencing any work on the Premises so that District may post such notices of non-responsibility with respect thereto as District may deem appropriate.

E. Not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the construction, major repair, renovation or demolition of any improvements on the Premises, Tenant shall provide District with sufficient evidence that it has obtained all required approvals and permits for the work and that Tenant or Tenant's contractor(s) has in effect, with premiums paid, adequate casualty and liability insurance (including builder's risk) coverage and workers compensation that is satisfactory to District in its sole discretion.

F. Upon commencement of construction of any improvements, Tenant shall cause the work to be diligently pursued to completion in accordance with the schedule for completion approved by District, subject to unavoidable delays caused by weather, supply shortages, strikes or acts of God.

G. All work or improvements shall be performed in a sound and workmanlike manner, in compliance with all applicable laws and building codes, in conformance with the plans and specifications approved by District and DSA, if applicable, or any modifications thereto which have been approved in writing by District. If an improvement project requires the use of DSA-approved Inspector services, Tenant shall reimburse District for the costs related to said services.

H. District or District's agent shall have a continuing right at all times during the period that improvements are being constructed on the Premises to enter the Premises and to inspect the work provided that such entries and inspections do not unreasonably interfere with the progress of the construction. Tenant shall require its contractors who construct improvements on the Premises to reasonably cooperate with District or its agent in such inspections.

I. Within ninety (90) days after completion of construction of any work of improvement on the Premises, Tenant shall deliver to District two (2) full and complete sets of as-built plans for the work so completed.

J. Removal of Alterations. Upon the expiration or sooner termination of the Agreement, Tenant shall, upon written demand by District, at Tenant's sole cost and expense, forthwith and with all due diligence, remove any alterations, additions, or improvements made by Tenants, designated by District to be removed, and Tenant shall, forthwith and with all due diligence, at its sole cost and expense, repair any damage to the Premises caused by such removal.

13. <u>CASUALTY DAMAGE</u>.

A. In the event that any portion of the Premises are destroyed or damaged by an uninsured peril, District or Tenant may, upon written notice to the other, given within thirty (30) days after the occurrence of the damage or destruction, elect to terminate this Lease; provided, however, that either party may, within thirty (30) days after receipt of notice, elect to make the required repairs and/or restoration at that party's sole cost and expense, in which event this Lease shall remain in full force and effect, and the party having made the election to restore or repair shall thereafter diligently proceed with the repairs and/or restoration.

B. In the event the Premises are damaged or destroyed from any insured peril to the extent of fifty percent (50%) or more of the then replacement cost of the Premises, District or Tenant may, upon written notice, given to the other within thirty (30) days after the occurrence of the damage or destruction, elect to terminate this Lease. If neither party gives notice in writing within this period, District shall be deemed to have elected to rebuild or restore the Premises, in which event District shall, at its expense, promptly rebuild or restore the Premises to their condition prior to the damage or destruction. In the event the Premises are damaged or destroyed from any insured peril to the extent of less than fifty percent (50%) of the then replacement cost of the Premises, District shall at District's expense, promptly rebuild or restore the Premises to their condition prior to the damage or destruction.

C. In the event that, pursuant to the foregoing provisions, District is to rebuild or restore the Premises, District shall, within thirty (30) days after the occurrence of such damage or destruction, provide Tenant with written notice of the time required for such repair or restoration. If this period is longer than one hundred twenty (120) days from the issuance of a building permit, Tenant may, within thirty (30) days of receipt of District's notice, elect to terminate the Lease by giving written notice to District of this election, whereupon the Lease shall immediately terminate. The period of time for District to complete the repair or restoration shall be extended for delays caused by the fault or neglect of Tenant or because of acts of God, labor disputes, strikes, fires, freight embargoes, rainy or stormy weather, inability to obtain materials, suppliers or fuels, acts of contractors or subcontractors, or delays of contractors or subcontractors due to such causes or other contingencies beyond the control of District. District's obligation to repair or restore the Premises shall not include restoration of Tenant's trade fixtures, equipment, merchandise, or any improvements, alterations, or additions made by Tenant to the Premises.

14. <u>DEFAULT</u>.

A. Events of Default. A breach of this Lease shall exist if any of the following events (hereinafter referred to as "Event of Default") shall occur:

(i) Default in the payment when due of any installment of rent or other payment required to be made by Tenant hereunder, and the default shall not have been cured within ten (10) days after written notice from District;

(ii) Tenant's failure to perform any other term, covenant or condition contained in this Lease and the failure shall have continued for thirty (30) days after written notice of such failure is given to Tenant; however, should Tenant's default involve a serious risk to the safety of the students or an illegal use of the premises, such cure must occur immediately. In the event the District has notified Tenant of default on the same basis on two prior occasions, the period to cure shall be reduced to five (5) business days. On the fourth occasion of default, the District may dispense with a cure period and determine that Tenant is in material default and commence termination of this Agreement pursuant to Section 14.B.

(1) The vacating or abandonment of the Premises by Tenant before the expiration of the Lease Term.

(2) The failure by Tenant to utilize the premises for the sole purpose of operating of the Program as authorized by this Lease and the terms and conditions set forth herein.

(3) Revocation or non-renewal of Tenant's license, permits or other authorizations to operate its program.

(4) Failure to keep in effect insurance as required herein.

(5) The sequestration of, attachment of, or execution on, any substantial part of the property of Tenant or on any property essential to the conduct of Tenant's business, shall have occurred and Tenant shall have failed to obtain a return or release of the property within thirty (30) days thereafter, or prior to sale pursuant to such sequestration, attachment or levy, whichever is earlier;

(6) The Tenant or any guarantor of Tenant's obligations hereunder shall generally not pay its debts as they become due or shall admit in writing its inability to pay its debts;

(7) Any case, proceeding or other action against the Tenant or any guarantor of the Tenant's obligations hereunder shall be commenced seeking to have an order for relief entered against it as debtor, or seeking reorganization, arrangement, adjustment, liquidation, dissolution or composition of it or its debts under any law relating to bankruptcy, insolvency, reorganization or relief of debtors, or seeking appointment of a receiver, trustee, custodian or other similar official for it or for all or any substantial part of its property, and the case, proceeding or other action (i) results in the entry of an order for relief against it which is

not fully stayed within seven (7) business days after the entry thereof or (ii) remains undismissed for a period of forty-five calendar (45) days.

B. Remedies. Upon any Event of Default, District shall have the following remedies, in addition to all other rights and remedies provided by law, to which District may resort cumulatively, or in the alternative:

(i) Recovery of Rent. District shall be entitled to keep this Lease in full force and effect (whether or not Tenant shall have abandoned the Premises) and to enforce all of its rights and remedies under this Lease, including the right to recover rent and other sums as they become due, plus interest at the rate of Bank of America's or its successor's reference rate plus three percent (3%) per annum from the due date of each installment of rent or other sum until paid.

(ii) Termination. District may terminate this Lease by giving Tenant written notice of termination. On the giving of the notice all of Tenant's rights in the Premises shall terminate. Upon the giving of the notice of termination, Tenant shall surrender and vacate the Premises in the condition required under this Lease, and District may re-enter and take possession of the Premises and all the remaining improvements or property and eject Tenant or any of Tenant's subtenants, assignees or other person or persons claiming any right under or through Tenant or eject some and not others or eject none. This Lease may also be terminated by a judgment specifically providing for termination. Any termination under this section shall not release Tenant from the payment of any sum then due District or from any claim for damages or rent previously accrued or then accruing against Tenant. In no event shall any one or more of the following actions by District constitute a termination of this Lease:

- (1) maintenance and preservation of the Premises;
- (2) efforts to relet the Premises;
- (3) appointment of a receiver in order to protect District's interest

hereunder;

(4) consent to any subletting of the Premises or assignment of this Lease by Tenant, whether pursuant to provisions hereof concerning subletting and assignment or otherwise; or,

(5) any other action by District or District's agents intended to mitigate the adverse effects from any breach of this Lease by Tenant.

(iii) Damages. In the event this Lease is terminated, District shall be entitled to damages in the following sums:

(1) the worth at the time of award of the unpaid rent which has been earned at the time of termination; plus,

(2) the worth at the time of award of the amount by which the unpaid rent which would have been earned after termination until the time of award exceeds the amount of such rental loss that Tenant proves could have been reasonably avoided; plus,

(3) the worth at the time of award of the amount by which the unpaid rent for the balance of the term after the time of award exceeds the amount of such rental loss that Tenant proves could be reasonably avoided; and,

(4) any other amount necessary to compensate District for all detriment proximately caused by Tenant's failure to perform Tenant's obligation under this Lease, or which in the ordinary course of business would be likely to result therefrom including, without limitation, the following: (i) expenses for cleaning, repairing or restoring the Premises; (ii) real estate broker's fees, reasonable advertising costs and other expenses of reletting the Premises; (iii) costs of carrying the Premises and insurance premiums thereon, utilities and security precautions; (iv) expenses in retaking possession of the Premises; (v) reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs; and, (vi) any unamortized real estate brokerage commission paid in connection with this Lease;

(5) the "worth at the time of award" of the amounts referred to in Subsections (a) and (b) of this section, is computed by allowing interest at the rate of Bank of America's or its successor reference rate plus three percent (3%) per annum. The "worth at the time of award" of the amounts referred to in Subsection (c) of this section is computed by discounting such amount at the discount rate of the Federal Reserve Board of San Francisco at the time of award plus one percent (1%). The term "rent" as used in this section shall include all sums required to be paid by Tenant to District pursuant to the term of this Lease.

15. <u>LIENS.</u> Tenant shall: (i) pay for all labor and services performed for, materials used by or furnished to Tenant or any contractor employed by Tenant with respect to the Premises; and, (ii) indemnify, defend and hold District and the Premises harmless and free from the perfection of any liens, claims, demands, encumbrances or judgments created or suffered by reason of any labor or services performed for, or materials used by or furnished to, Tenant or any contractor employed by Tenant with respect to the Premises; and, (iii) give notice to District in writing fifteen (15) days prior to employing any laborer or contractor to perform services related to, or receiving materials for use upon, the Premises; and, (iv) permit District to post a notice of non-responsibility in accordance with the statutory requirements of California Civil Code Section 3094 or any amendment thereof. In the event Tenant is required to post an improvement bond with a public agency in connection with the above, Tenant agrees to include District as an additional obligee.

16. <u>INSPECTION OF PREMISES</u>. Tenant agrees to provide District with a set of keys for emergency repairs. Tenant shall permit District and its agents to enter the Premises at any reasonable time for the purpose of inspecting the same, performing District's maintenance and repair responsibilities, or posting a notice of non-responsibility for alterations, additions, or repairs. In addition to the right granted to District under Section 12 to inspect improvements under construction on the Premises, District and its authorized agents and representatives shall have the right throughout the Term of this Lease to enter the Premises at all reasonable times

during usual business hours and upon reasonable notice for the purpose of inspecting the Premises or exhibiting them to prospective lessees or occupants.

17. <u>HOLDING OVER</u>. Should Tenant hold over in possession after the expiration of the original term or any extended term of this Lease, the holding over shall not be deemed to extend the term or renew the Lease, but the tenancy thereafter shall continue upon the covenants and conditions herein set forth at 150% (one hundred fifty percent) of the monthly rental (Holding Over Rent) of the last expiring term unless Tenant and District mutually agree to a different rental amount.

18. <u>NOTICES</u>. Any notices which either of the parties hereto is required or may desire to send or deliver to give to the other party, shall be mailed, certified mail, return receipt requested, postage prepaid, or delivered, with all charges prepaid, to such other party at the address listed below, or to such address as either party may designate to the other from time to time in writing.

Tenant:

The date of service of any notice mailed as aforesaid shall be deemed to be five (5) days after the date of such mailing, and the date of service of any notice hand delivered, as aforesaid, shall be deemed to be one (1) day after delivery thereof to the delivery service office.

19. <u>ATTORNEYS' FEES.</u> In the event either party shall bring any action or legal proceeding for damages for any alleged breach of any provision of this Lease, to recover rent or possession of the Premises, to terminate this Lease, or to enforce, protect or establish any term or covenant of this Lease or right or remedy of either party, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover, as a part of the action or proceeding, reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs, including attorneys' fees and costs for appeal, as may be fixed by the court or jury. The term "prevailing party" shall mean the party who received substantially the relief requested, whether by settlement, dismissal, summary judgment, judgment, or otherwise.

20. <u>ASSIGNMENT</u>. The Tenant may not assign this Lease without District's consent and written approval. Any assignment of this Lease must be in writing and signed by District and Tenant. This Lease cannot be assigned during the first five years of the Lease Term. No assignment or transfer shall be effective until there shall have been delivered to District an agreement, or a duplicate original of such assignment containing an agreement, in recordable form, executed by the assignor and the proposed assignee whereby such assignee agrees, expressly for the benefit of District, to assume, keep and perform, and be bound by each and all of the covenants, conditions, restrictions and provisions herein contained on the part of Tenant, and any such assignment or transfer shall be subject to each and all of the covenants, conditions, Page 15

restrictions and provisions hereof. Any assignment in violation of this Section shall be void and of no effect. Tenant agrees that the District may assign any interest in this Lease, as required or desired at any time, provided that the assignment will not disturb the Tenant's possession and quiet enjoyment of the Premises.

21. <u>SUCCESSORS</u>. This Lease contains all of the covenants, agreements, representations and provisions thereof and shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon the respective heirs, legal representatives, executors, administrators, successors and assigns of the parties hereto, except as provided in the preceding Section.

22. <u>SURRENDER OF LEASE NOT MERGER</u>. The voluntary or other surrender of this Lease by Tenant, or a mutual cancellation thereof, shall not work a merger and shall, at the option of District, terminate all or any existing subleases or subtenancies, or operate as an assignment to District of any or all subleases or subtenancy.

23. <u>WAIVER</u>. The waiver by District or Tenant of any breach of any term, covenant or condition or any subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant or condition herein contained shall not be deemed to be a waiver of the term, covenant or condition or any subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant or condition herein contained.

24. <u>GENERAL</u>.

A. The captions and section headings used in this Lease are for the purposes of convenience only. They shall not be construed to limit or extend the meaning of any part of this Lease.

B. Time is of the essence for the performance of each term, covenant and condition of this Lease.

C. In case any one or more of the provisions contained herein, except for the payment of rent, shall for any reason be held to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect, such invalidity, illegality or unenforceability shall not affect any other provision of this Lease, but this Lease shall be construed as if such invalid, illegal or unenforceable provision had not been contained herein. This Lease shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

D. If Tenant is more than one person or entity, each such person or entity shall be jointly and severally liable for the obligations of Tenant hereunder.

25. <u>SIGNS</u>. Tenant shall at Tenant's cost have the right and entitlement to place Tenant's signs on the Premises, and otherwise to advertise its services, provided Tenant obtains the approval and consent of District. The approval and consent shall not be unreasonably withheld. Any signs shall be at Tenant's cost and in compliance with the local ordinances pertaining thereto. In connection with the placement of such signs, District agrees to cooperate with Tenant in obtaining any governmental permits which may be necessary. Throughout the Term of this Lease Tenant shall, at its sole cost and expense, maintain the signage and all appurtenances in good condition and repair. At the termination of this Lease, Tenant shall remove any signs that it

has placed on the School Site in which the Premises are located, and shall repair any damage caused by the installation or removal of those signs.

26. <u>SURRENDER OF THE PREMISES</u>. On the last day of the term hereof, or on sooner termination of this Lease, Tenant shall surrender to District the Premises and any then existing improvements in good order, condition and repair, reasonable wear and tear excepted, free and clear of all liens, claims and encumbrances. This condition shall be similar to that existing as of the Commencement Date of this Lease excepting normal ordinary wear and tear and any structural improvements made by District subsequent to the Commencement Date. This Lease shall operate as a conveyance and assignment to the District of any improvements identified by the District to remain on the School Site. Tenant shall remove from the Premises all of Tenant's personal property, trade fixtures, and any improvements made by Tenant which District agrees will be removed by Tenant. All property not so removed shall be deemed abandoned by Tenant. If the Premises are not so surrendered at the termination of this Lease, Tenant shall indemnify District against loss or liability resulting from delay by Tenant in so surrendering the Premises including, without limitation, any claims made by any succeeding Tenant or losses to District due to lost opportunities to Lease to succeeding tenants.

27. <u>DISTRICT'S COVENANTS</u>. The District covenants, warrants and represents that it has full right and power to execute and perform this Lease, and to grant the estate demised herein, and covenants that Tenant on paying rent as herein provided and performing the covenants hereof shall peaceably and quietly have, hold and enjoy the demised Premises and all right, easements, appurtenances and privileges belonging or in any way appertaining thereto, during the term of this Lease and any extension or renewal thereof.

28. <u>HAZARDOUS MATERIALS</u>. District and Tenant agree as follows with respect to the existence or use of Hazardous Materials on the Premises including any improvements made by Tenant.

As used herein, the term "Hazardous Materials" means any Α. Definition. hazardous or toxic substance, material or waste that is or becomes regulated by any local governmental authority, the State of California or the United States Government. The term "Hazardous Materials" includes, without limitation, petroleum products, asbestos, PCB's, and any material or substance which is (i) defined as hazardous or extremely hazardous pursuant to Title 22 of the California Code of Regulations, Division 4.5, Chapter 11, Article 4, Section 66261.30 et seq. (ii) defined as a "hazardous waste" pursuant to Section (14) of the federal Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, 42 U.S.C. 6901 et. seq. (42 U.S.C. 6903), or (iii) defined as a "hazardous substance" pursuant to Section 10 of the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act, 42 U.S.C. 9601 et. seq. (42 U.S.C. 9601). As used herein, the term "Hazardous Materials Law" shall mean any statute, law, ordinance, or regulation of any governmental body or agency (including the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the California Regional Water Quality Control Board, and the California Department of Health Services) which regulates the use, storage, release or disposal of any Hazardous Material.

B. Hazardous Materials. Tenant shall not cause or permit any Hazardous Material to be generated, brought onto, used, stored, or disposed of in or about the Premises and any Page 17

improvements by Tenant or its agents, employees, contractors, subtenants, or invitees, except for limited quantities of standard office, classroom and janitorial supplies (which shall be used and stored in strict compliance with Environmental Laws). Tenant shall comply with all Environmental Laws.

C. Responsibility of Tenant. From and after the commencement date, Tenant shall be solely responsible for all environmental matters affecting the Premises and any improvements. Tenant has been afforded the opportunity under the Option Agreement to enter the Premises during the option period for the purpose of conducting tests, engineering studies, to satisfy itself of the condition of the Premises with respect to Hazardous Materials. Without limiting the preceding sentence:

(i) Any handling, transportation, storage, treatment, disposal or use of Hazardous Materials in or about the Premises and any improvements by any person or entity shall be the responsibility of Tenant and shall strictly comply with all applicable Hazardous Materials Laws and the provisions of this Lease.

(ii) shall be the duty of Tenant to insure that the Premises and any improvements are at all times in strict compliance with all Hazardous Materials Laws and that all activities conducted in or about the Premises and improvements comply in every respect with all applicable Hazardous Materials Laws including, but not limited to, all notification, record keeping, and maintenance requirements of such Laws.

(iii) Tenant shall have and discharge all of the duties and obligations of the owner of the Premises and improvements under applicable Hazardous Materials Laws, including, but not limited to, response and remediation; and

(iv) Tenant shall be responsible for all liability to third parties who may be harmed or claim harm resulting from an environmental condition on or about the Premises and any improvements.

D. Indemnification. Tenant shall indemnify, defend upon demand with counsel reasonably acceptable to District, and hold harmless District and its trustees, agents and employees from and against any liabilities, losses, claims, damages, lost profits, consequential damages, interest, penalties, fines, monetary sanctions, attorneys' fees, experts' fees, court costs, remediation costs, investigation costs, and other expenses which result from or arise in any manner whatsoever out of the use, storage, treatment, transportation, release, disposal, or presence from any cause or source whatsoever of Hazardous Materials on or about the Premises and any improvements.

E. Tenant Action. If the presence of Hazardous Materials on the Premises and any improvements (from any source whatsoever) results in contamination or deterioration of water or soil resulting in a level of contamination greater than the levels established as acceptable by any governmental agency having jurisdiction over such contamination, and if the Tenant is responsible therefore under applicable law, then Tenant shall, at its sole cost and expense, promptly take any and all action necessary to investigate and remediate such contamination if

required by law or as a condition to the issuance or continuing effectiveness of any governmental approval which relates to the use of the Premises and any improvements or any part thereof. Tenant shall further be solely responsible for, and shall defend, indemnify and hold District and its agents harmless from and against, all claims, costs and liabilities, including attorneys' fees and costs, arising out of or in connection with any investigation and remediation required hereunder to return the Premises and any improvements to full compliance with all Hazardous Materials Laws.

F. Notice. District and Tenant shall each give written notice to the other as soon as reasonably practicable of (i) any communication received from any governmental authority concerning Hazardous Materials which relates to the Premises and any improvements, and (ii) any contamination of the Premises and any improvements by Hazardous Materials which constitutes a violation of any Hazardous Materials Law. Tenant and subtenants may use small quantities of household chemicals such as adhesives, lubricants, and cleaning fluids in order to conduct their business on the Premises and any improvements and such other Hazardous Materials as are necessary for the operation of their respective businesses of which District receives notice prior to such Hazardous Materials being brought onto the Premises and any improvements and to which District consents in writing. As a condition to its consent, District may require from Tenant or any subtenant additional security and/or indemnification against potential claims or losses resulting from the presence or use of such Hazardous Materials at or on the Premises and any improvements. At any time during the Term, Tenant shall, within thirty (30) days after written request therefore received from District, disclose in writing all Hazardous Materials that are being used by Tenant or subtenants on the Premises and any improvements, the nature of the use, and the manner of storage and disposal.

G. Monitoring Wells. In the event that District has reason to believe that Hazardous Materials may be present on the Premises and any improvements, District may require that, at Tenant's expense, testing wells be installed on the Premises and any improvements, at locations determined by District and Tenant, and may cause the ground water to be tested to detect the presence of Hazardous Materials by the use of such tests as are then customarily used for such purposes. Tenant shall comply promptly with any such request.

H. Survival. The obligations of Tenant under this Section shall survive the expiration or earlier termination of this Lease. The rights and obligations of District and Tenant with respect to issues relating to Hazardous Materials are exclusively established by this Section. In the event of any inconsistency between any part of this Lease and this Section, the terms of this Section shall control.

I. In the event that Tenant causes any Hazardous Materials to be released, spilled or otherwise exposed through its use and occupancy of the Premises, such as, but not limited to remodeling or other construction, Tenant shall be solely responsible for all costs associated with the proper handling, mitigation, remediation and disposal of the Hazardous Materials and all related cleanup.

29. <u>PARKING</u>. Tenant shall have non-exclusive use of any parking lot located on the School Site. Tenant shall not abandon any inoperative vehicles or equipment on any portion of the

School Site.

30. <u>SUBLEASING</u>. Tenant shall not have the right to sublease the Premises or any other portion of the School Site.

31. <u>NO SUBORDINATION</u>. Tenant agrees that District's fee interest shall at all times be and remain unsubordinated to any leasehold mortgage which may be imposed upon Tenant's leasehold interest hereunder or upon the improvements, and that nothing contained in this Lease shall be construed as an agreement by District to subject its fee interest to any lien. Nothing in this Section or in any other provision of this Lease shall be construed as an agreement by District to subordinate its fee interest in the Premises to any leasehold mortgage or other lien or right. No leasehold mortgage shall impair District from enforcing its rights and remedies herein or by law provided.

32. <u>ENTIRE AGREEMENT</u>. This Lease constitutes the entire understanding between the parties hereto and no addition to or modification of, any term or provision of this Lease shall be effective until set forth in writing signed by both District and Tenant.

33. <u>COOPERATON WITH OTHER OCCUPANTS OF THE PROPERTY</u>. It is understood and recognized by Tenant that the School Site, of which the Premises is a part, will be used by other parties, including District, and Tenant shall cooperate with the other parties in reaching amicable arrangements concerning such matters as use of the parking areas, playgrounds, policing of common areas, custodial services, and security measures.

34. <u>SEVERABILITY</u>. The provisions of this Lease are declared to be severable, and if any provision herein is invalidated by any court, the remaining provisions shall not be affected thereby and shall be fully enforceable, unless such enforcement would be unreasonable or inequitable under all the circumstances or would frustrate the purposes of this Lease.

35. <u>JURISDICTION AND VENUE</u>. This Lease has been executed and delivered in the State of California and the validity, enforceability and interpretation of any of the clauses of this Lease shall be determined and governed by the laws of the State of California. To the fullest extent permitted by California law, the county in which the School Site is located shall be the venue for any action or proceeding that may be brought or arise out of, in connection with or by reason of this Lease.
